

Life Aboard French Ship

Life on a French ship is not so much different from that on an up-to-date Canadian deep-sea vessel, it is to be observed on a visit to the French Line freighter Vire at present discharging 1000 tons of Belgian steel at Watson Island dock to be used in construction of the Columbia Cellulose Co's celanese mill.

There is no difficulty in conversing with the officers and crew for a large majority of them speak quite good and intelligible English, indicating the high universality of that language—if any language is universal.

One thing quite different about the French ship, however, is the food, in the preparation of which there is the distinctly French touch. And, of the meals, breakfast is probably the most different. The French sailor is a light breakfast eater. He is satisfied with his tea or coffee and bread roll and butter—there are no cereals, ham and eggs, stacks of hot or toast on the French sailor's morning bill-of-fare. However, he makes up for that on his noon and evening meals with soup, meats, variety of pickled fish and vegetables and the inevitable French fried potatoes. Dessert is another item on which the Frenchman aboard ship goes light. One hears much about those delicious French pastries but the fact is that pie is practically unknown. The stock dessert is a single apple. French wine is always on the table, being used largely instead of water. Thursdays and Sundays are the special meal days aboard the French ship when the chef rises to the occasion with special preparation of the most luscious cuts from his meat cooler.

Out of Antwerp February 9, the Vire arrived at Watson Island.

The objects of the Company are to construct, install, maintain, equip, own, operate and use a pipe line or pipe lines, to transport or transmit natural gas, from the general Edmonton area of the Province of Alberta or from a point or points which are north of Township 52 in the said Province or from a point or points in the north-western part of the Province of British Columbia where natural gas can be obtained to a point or points within, at or near the Cities of Vancouver and New Westminster in the Province of British Columbia, and from there to the State of Washington, and other places in the United States of America; to construct, install, maintain, equip, own, operate and use appropriate branch or lateral gathering and distributing pipe lines to the main line of lines to or from consumers, distributors or suppliers of natural gas convenient to the main line or lines; to transport, transmit, pipe and convey, natural gas from such gas, and oil gas, areas in the Provinces of Alberta and British Columbia as may be approved by duly constituted governmental authority through such pipe line or pipe lines, to construct, acquire, maintain, own, operate and use all such structures, reservoirs, plants, equipment and facilities for the gathering, transportation and storage of natural gas; to buy, or otherwise acquire, natural gas and a mixture of artificial and natural gas; to sell, distribute or otherwise dispose of natural gas and a mixture of artificial and natural gas; to acquire and hold land for the purposes of the Company, subject to sections 215 to 248 inclusive of the Railway Act so far as applicable. The works of the Company will extend beyond the limits of one Province and will be declared to be for the general advantage of Canada.

The said Company requests it be subject to any Act passed by the Parliament of Canada for the purpose of regulating the construction, maintenance and operation of pipe lines, plant and equipment used in the transportation, storage and distribution of natural gas.

Sport Shots

Home-bred youngsters have a fighting chance to crash British hockey, which imported Canadians have dominated since its inception in the early '30's. Members of the eight English major-league clubs, sponsoring ambitious schemes to cultivate local talent, find they don't have to scrape for pupils. Keen young Britons, with pipe-dream eyes on local rinks, are clamoring in hundreds for a chance to develop their stuff.

The biggest "school" for up-and-coming youngsters is Wembley, main scene of the Olympic Games last year. At the Empire Pool, with its 8,000-seat capacity, six embryo teams regularly take the ice. And on match nights, when Wembley Lions or Wembley Monarchs are at home, two of the junior teams play a "baby" game before the main clash. To a lesser extent, other league clubs follow the same routine. The youngsters provide most of their own kit.

More than 200 weekly applications for trials are received at Wembley, entailing much weeding. "We have plenty of keen lads," said a Wembley official. "But there are not many who will make the grade. Of the six teams we run now, maybe 12 players will eventually be good enough for senior or junior hockey." Main difficulty in developing British players is lack of ice. There is not natural ice in the United Kingdom and present rink accommodation cannot cope with hockey's increasing popularity.

Whatever the outcome of current training schemes, it is thought several seasons will elapse before Canadian-imported players can be reduced appreciably. A country-wide, home-bred player system might then hold imports to individual stars. The Canadians have a popular following in Britain but officials say it is expensive to bring them over. Britons playing in the major league, on the other hand, would both eliminate transport costs and add local flavor to spectator interest.

A fond hope of British hockey fans is a home-bred amateur national team good enough to hold its own in international events.

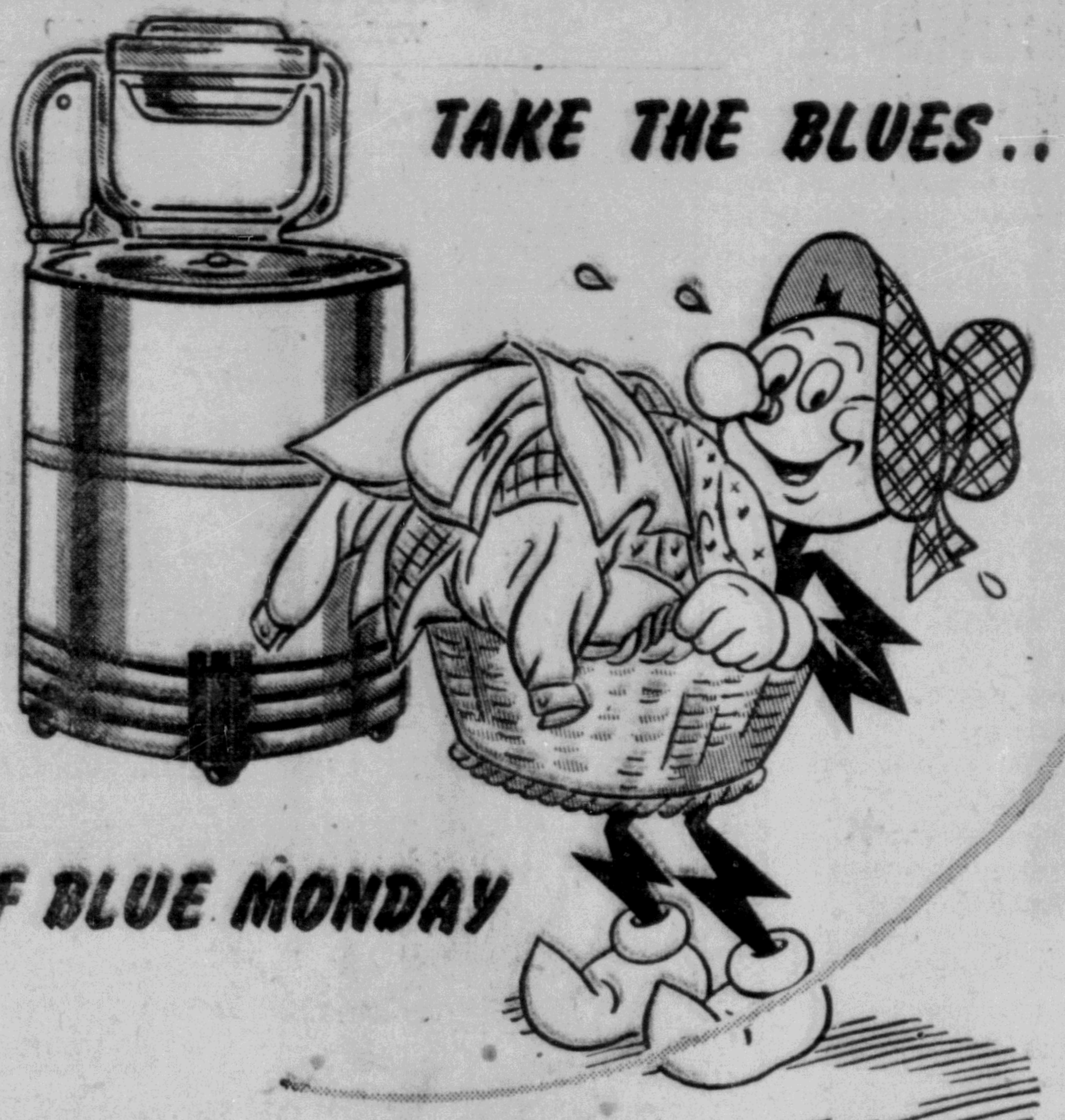
