

# Main Outlet

When delegates from co-operatives along the north line of Canadian National Railways met on August 23 and 24 at Burns Lake to discuss the formation of a northern regional council, many vital subjects were discussed including the development of uniform and stricter grading of agricultural products for sale through the Prince Rupert outlets, and greater utilization of Prince Rupert as the main outlet for production possibilities of extending the circularization of the Burns Lake Coop bulletin, now known as the Omineca Co-op Forum, to cove: all districts represented by the delegates. Grant Smith, present producer of the Omineca Co-op Forum, will arrange for the distribution of this publication on a broader scale with a change to a more suitable name.

Plans were also discussed for the co-ordination of all co-operative activities, social and economic. This will include mass' purchasing, which it was felt would benefit all co-operatives concerned. A provisional executive was elected to set the date of the first general meeting and to carry on business until that time. 


