RENTS IN PRINCE RUPERT LOWEST ARE IMPRESSED

LONDON ()-Seven Canadian farm experts who, returning to Canada aboard the Aquitania, on Wednesday, said today that they were impressed, after two months' study, by the British Agriculture Ministty's advisory service to farmers.

"British farmers seem imbued with the importance of preserving the fertility and productivity of their soils," said Prof. G. N. Ruhnke; director of agricultural research in Ontario, "My impression is that they look on livestock crops and soils as being very closely related and this scientific approach to the problem evidently reflects the ministry's policy."




