The night's entertainment starts off with two Junior features in the early evening, Sea Cadets playing Scouts and Kinsmen tangling with Stone's Kinsmen are the veterans in this division, the three other teams being entered for the first time. The Juniors have already had an opportunity to show their wares and the pre-season games held last week were real crowd pleasers.


