## Declares Intention is to Export Power; Would Ruin Fisheries

NEW WESTMINSTER (CP)—Senator Tom Reid charged Thursday that the Aluminum Company of Canada plans to export power to the United States. He said the company was seeking "extra exclusive rights" in British Columbia so that it may sell power not required for the aluminum industry.

There had been "secret negotiations," Reid declared and the provincial government was, endeavouring to "put something over." The project should not be allowed to interfere with the fishing industry.
