FINED FOR SUPPLYING

Harry Innes was fined \$50 on each of two charges of supplying liquor to Indians when he appeared before Magistrate W. D. Vance in city police court Monday. In default of the fines, he was sentenced to a month in jail on each of the counts. He also was assessed \$3.50 court costs.
