

LABOR TROUBLE MAY HIT LUMBER SHIPMENTS HERE

A labor dispute which has brought a halt to scow loadings at the Juneau Spruce Corporation, may delay or halt the shipment of lumber from the Alaska capital to the continental United States via Prince Rupert.

The dispute, involving Juneau longshoremen, has resulted in the company's office at Seattle ordering the cessation of scow loadings until the situation is cleared up. It strikes a blow against the newly organized plan to route Alaskan lumber through this port.

However, despite the fact that

the company has stopped loadings, Canadian National freight representatives here have received no word that the service is to be halted and they are expecting the second scowload of lumber here shortly.

"We rather expected that the second scowload of lumber would have arrived this week-end," the Daily News was told today. "It may have been held up by this trouble but we have not been advised of it."

Normally, the railway company would not be advised of the shipment until it is ready for sailing south.

The Juneau Spruce Corporation routed more than 600,000 board feet of spruce lumber through Prince Rupert 10 days ago. The company planned to continue shipments throughout the summer to the United States.

The second shipment, when it arrives, is to be unloaded over the ocean dock, the eastern section of which has been returned to Canadian National Railways from War Assets Corporation. The first shipment was unloaded at the dry dock.

SHIPS and— WATERFRONT

Southbound to Vancouver after a voyage to Skagway with a full cargo for transfer to rail for delivery to the Yukon, Frank Waterhouse freighter Chilliwack, Capt. Harry Stevens, arrived in port at 3:30 Sunday afternoon and, after taking on oil at the Imperial Oil Co. wharf and general cargo, sailed early Monday morning for Vancouver. Southbound she is calling at Butedale to load 32,000 gallons of fish oil. On her way here from Skagway she had called at Stewart and loaded 800 tons of Premier concentrates.

Second vessel of the Waterhouse Line to visit Prince Rupert within 24 hours was the freighter Southholm, Capt. William Gleason, which was in port during this mornin'. She came north via the Queen Charlotte Islands and, among other calls, was at Massett to load lumber. The vessel, which headed south from here, was also at Port Edward and other Skeena River points with cannery supplies.

Commander F. J. Schreiber, of the Alaska coastguard service, has caught a 46½-pound king salmon, largest qualifying fish caught in the Ketchikan king salmon derby. It was 44½ inches long, with a girth of thirty inches. Derby Day will be June 6 with a top prize of \$4,500. It was on March 6 that the qualifying lists were opened.

SEIZED TROLLER RETURNING TO ALASKAN PORT

The 45-foot American troller Betty M., seized at Atli Inlet last week for alleged infraction of the International halibut regulations, was permitted to leave port here on Sunday for Ketchikan where she will face prosecution on a charge of being unlawfully in possession of halibut.

The Betty M., Capt. Harley R. Martin, was brought to Prince Rupert Thursday night by the fisheries patrol boat Sooke Post, after Inspector Maurice Houghton was said to have found 16 halibut aboard.

International halibut regulations do not permit possession of that type of fish out of season. The season does not open until May 1.

The Betty M. was allowed to proceed to Ketchikan where the case will be taken up by the American authorities. Under the regulations, fishermen accused of violating the regulations are dealt with by the governments of the country to which they belong.

COUNCIL HITS AT DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME

A "vigorous" protest against the imposition of daylight saving time in central British Columbia by government order-in-council will be lodged by the city of Prince Rupert and at least one other municipality.

Council agreed last night to join the village of Smithers in expressing dissatisfaction at "government interference with time" without consulting the citizens of the province. Smithers village council has sent petitions to communities along the railway line as far east as McBride.

Alderman Arthur Brooksbank eagerly led the pack when the aldermen criticized the edict which made it necessary for British Columbians to leave their beds an hour earlier.

"It has been foisted on B.C. by a minority in Vancouver," he asserted. "It may help a few golf and tennis players in Kitilano and Shaughnessy but it is no good here."

Mayor Arnold agreed that it was the "Vancouver golf players," too.

"You should have heard the complaints at the Union of B.C. Municipalities convention. The farming communities of the Fraser Valley are dead against it. They blame the Vancouver golf players."

Alderman Rudderham opposed the way the government invoked daylight saving time and objected to anyone interfering with the clock.

"This thing was passed by order-in-council, without approaching the people about it at all," he declared. "It benefits no one and is something that should be left alone."

It created an added difficulty and danger for fishermen, he said, because the tide books are prepared on the basis of standard time. Fishermen have to make allowance for an extra hour when computing tides.

"Criminal, nonsensical," agreed Alderman Casey.

The aldermen agreed with a suggestion by Alderman T. B. Black that legislative members for the central B.C. region be asked to bring the matter up in the house before it is adjourned this week.
