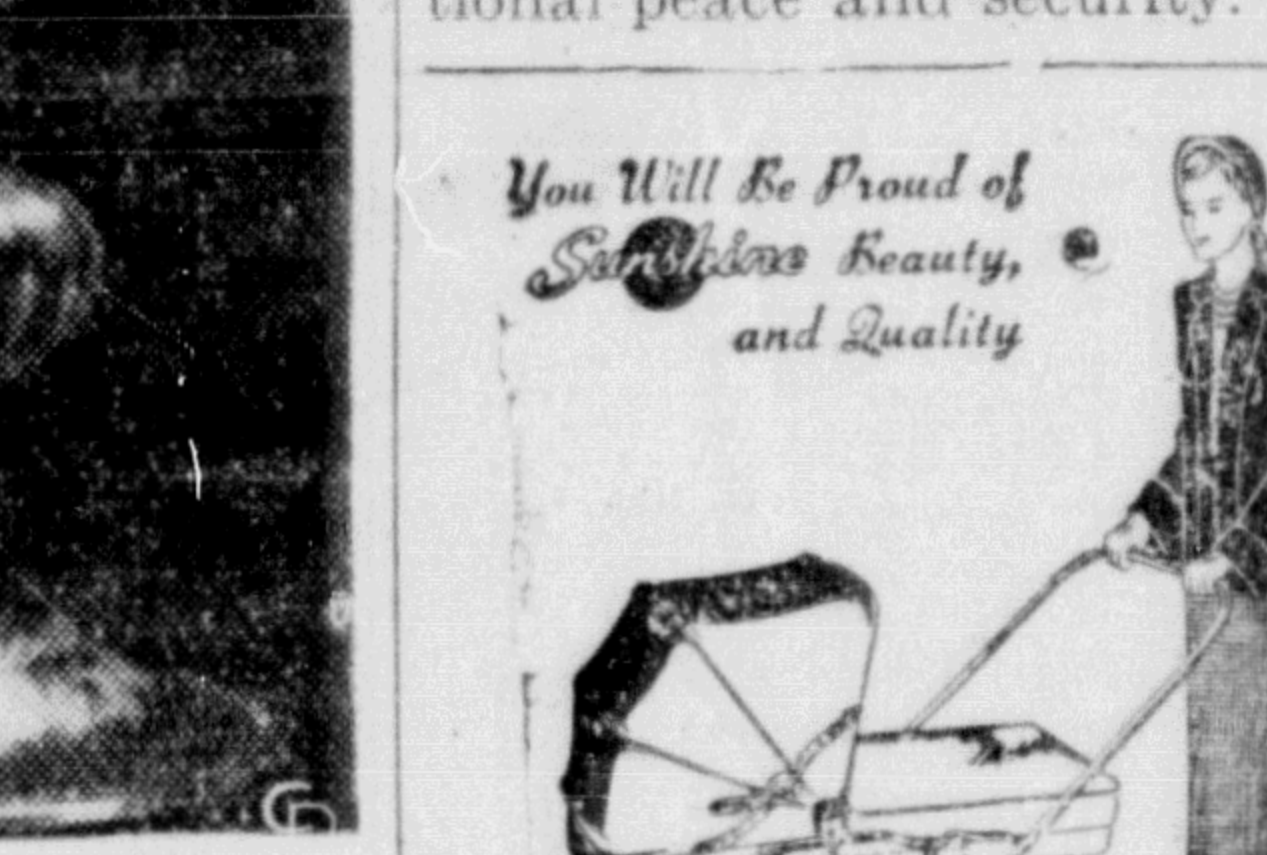
Winners of all districts except Vancouver, will be determined by August 17. They, and their chaperons, will then journey to Vancouver to compete in the finals.

AT ANTIQUE FAIR—A wonderful example of an Elizabethan glass goblet made in London in 1587, ten years before the Spanish Armada set sail for England, was shown at the Eighth Antique Dealers' Fair at Grosvenor House, Park Lane, London, recently. The goblet, made by Giacomo Verzelini and engraved by Anthony de Lysle, is 8 3/4 inches high and the diameter of the bowl is 3 3/4 inches. It is the earliest known perfect example of a Verzelini glass goblet and only seven others are known to exist, five of them badly damaged.
