

Big Blizzard With Damage of \$100,000

WINDSOR ()-Two days after the New Year's night blizzard which left six dead and caused many thousands of dollars property damage, Southern Ontario was still digging itself out today. Repair crews continued to restore hydro-electric and telephone service as others struggled to complete clearing of drifted highways and roads from Windsor on the west to Kingston on

The greatest damage has been in Windsor and nearby Essex communities which were first to be hit by the storm.

Telephone service is not expected to be restored in Windsor until the middle of next week.

Damage to the border city alone is estimated at \$100,000.
