of age and it was there that he lived and received his schooling. At the age of 21, he obtained an appointment to the old city police force at Port Alberni August 30, 1929. With the taking over of the municipality by the B. C. Police in 1934, he went over to the provincial force. In 1937 he was transferred to Prince George and in 1942 was moved to Vancouver Island, serving at Duncan and Ladysmith before being promoted to Corporal in 1946 and being moved to Prince Rupert.

Corp. Taylor has always been interested in athletics and has specialized in boxing, baseball and basketball, having been a member of championship teams

in the Fraser Valley during his younger days. Work among the youth has also commanded his attention.

Corp. Taylor has also handled a diversity of case types during his police work.

Today Corp. Taylor was functioning as chief of the city detachment while Sgt. L. A. N. Poterton went to divisional headquarters to take charge there during the absence of Inspector F. B. Woods-Johnson who left today for vacation.

The officer was married to Miss Mary Suttie of Calgary, June 18, 1930, and they have two daughters, Shirley and Joan, and one son, Kenneth.
