REPORT OF EXECUTIVE

Heard by Local Teachers—
Prepare for General Convention

Matters dealt with at the quarterly convention of the B. C. Teachers' Federation executive in Vancouver last month were subjects of a report delivered to the monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Teachers' Association by J. S. Wilson this week.

Mr. Wilson, who is a member of the executive of the federation, reported that the federation is keenly interested in enlarging the pensions of superannuated teachers who now receive between \$35 and \$40 a month.

In addition, the federation favors the granting of pensions to elder citizens without the "means test," he reported.

The executive also is disturbed about current principals' rating scales which it believes, are unfair both to the principals and teachers.

The preliminary agenda for the B.C.T.F. general convention which will be held in Vancouver Easter week was discussed.

T. G. Bateman, T. Fletcher and J. Henry were appointed as a resolutions committee to draw up recommendations to be placed before the convention.

The meeting also heard a report from the association's school planning committee, and appointed R. G. Moore to be a member of it.

A vote of thanks to Mr. Wilson was accorded as well as one for the federation executive for the work being done for the benefit of teachers in this district and throughout the province.

(January 10, 1923)
