Bluenose Puck Fans Really Blue Over Calibre Of Players

HALIFAX — Many Maritime hockey fans have been grumbling this year that they have to pay too much for tickets to watch the calibre of Senior "A" hockey offered in both the Maritime and Cape Breton Senior Hockey Leagues.

An now one fan, recently returned from a trip to Ontario and Quebec, has expressed his views in writing to Alex (Halifax Herald) Nickerson. Taking as his general theme that hockey players, generally, are paid out of proportion to their ability, the fan goes on to compare the hockey played in the Maritimes with that played in Ontario and Quebec.
