BIBLE STUDY COURSE PLANNED FOR HIGH SCHOOL

It is some years since the Department of Education at Victoria agreed on Bible study courses for High School students for which credits could be received, though these courses have to be taken off school property and out of school hours. So far as is known there has been no attempt at a community level to interest the High School students in these courses in Prince Rupert.

This year, however, the Prince Rupert Ministerial Association is offering the course, Bible study, to High School students. A weekly class period held probably at the Civic Centre with the departmental examination at the end and one credit for those who pass. Principal A. M. Hurst has been consulted and has expressed himself as ready to lend all possible co-operation.

The course has been set up for 35 periods with five different ministers of the city taking part and the Rev. Basil S. Prockter, President of the Association as director of studies.

Part One—The Bible, books, writers, languages, versions, etc. Rev. Earl Solland. Five periods.

Part Two—Abraham to Solomon. Selected passages. Ven. Archdeacon Hodson. Three periods.

Part Three—The Prophets. Selected passages. Rev. R. A. Wilson. Seven periods.

Part Four—The Ministry of Jesus Christ. St. Mark 1-10. Rev. Paul Barber. Eight periods.

Part Five—Passion and Resurrection of Christ. St. Mark 10-15. Rev. F. Antrobus. Seven periods.

Since it would not be feasible to use all the ministers in the one year on the one course, it was deemed wise by the Association this year to omit an immediate call on the time of the Salvation Army Captain and the Presbyterian minister since their respective ministries are either pending or in each case a change of leadership.
