VANCOUVER, (P)— Bearded Arctic explorer Sir Hubert Wilkins of Australia and jet aircraft inventor Sir Frank Wittle talked of war here Monday while attending the North West Aviation Planning Council.

"If war comes," said Sir Frank, 'it will not be a war to end war, but a war to end civilization."

Sir Hubert said that if war comes, both piloted and guided missiles would be used.

BERLIN CRISIS "BEYOND U.N.," REDS DECLARE

BERLIN ()-German Communists said today that the General Assembly of the United Nations lacked authority to debate the Berlin crisis, which, they said could be settled only by the four powers involved.

Bringing the question before the assembly will result in the "torpedoing" of the prolonged Big Four conference in Moscow.

They also charged that the Germans were being groomed for the role of mercenary solhe may diers in a future war against himself the Soviet Union.
