DARING ROBBERY-Two gunmen held up a branch of the Imperial Bank of Canada in Northern Ontario town of Larder Lake escaped with cash estimated at from \$2,000 to \$12,000 and attempted a getaway in a stolen plane. Inexperienced fliers, they crashed the plane on the far shore of the lake and one man was captured. He claimed his companion had drowned when he fell in the lake, together with the loot, but skeptical police continued the search and captured the missing robber.
