Soccer Game Well Fought

There were many changes from the originally selected teams but the two aggregations gave an interesting display though a scoreless draw would have represented the balance of play more accurately than the 3-0 score. The President's eleven played in blue and the Vice-President's team in yellow.

Play was ragged at the start. Olsen gave Armstrong an opening that required all of Brodie's skill to block. Bremner saved from Ward and Brodie from Wyatt. Manton made headway but Lien cleared. Yelland gave Brodie a good shot and the Blues were lucky when Brodie missed Manton's cross but there was no player to take advantage of the slip. From Ward's pass Wilson opened the scoring. Nelson cleared well but the Blues went two goals up when

The second half saw McCrimmon crossing a fine centre but Eby saved. Nelson was prominent with two long clearances and then Dawes was lucky to stop Armstrong. Wilson and Mercer were fast and clever but Olsen and Greer checked them. Murray took a fine corner kick. Wyatt, Armstrong and McCrimmon combined beautifully but the ball was scrambled clear. Manton crossed a fine centre that Brodie missed but the ball went past. Then Brodie had to be smart to clear from Yelland and then from Manton. Wyatt headed past from Manton's cross. Ward shot just high and then Greer cleared well. Wilson just missed from Ward's pass and later hit the upright. Sharpe was noticeable for clever interceptions but the blues came back and Manton's header hit the upright. Brodie's goal seemed to have horseshoes protecting it at times. Wyatt hit the upright and then Brodie saved well. McCrimmon shot just too high. Wilson headed Ward's centre against Bremner.
