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## BERLIN DISPUTE BEFORE UNITED NATIONS

### Where Is War, Russia Will Be Blame, Declares Bevin

British Foreign Secretary Is Given Ovation By General Assembly—Berlin Suggests Occupants Get Out

PARIS (CP)—Great Britain, the United States and France last night accused Russia of threatening world peace by her actions in Berlin and sent the issue to the United Nations Security Council. Complete collapse of the secret talks of western envoys with Russia advanced the cold war to a new and

The Russians had demanded control over Allied air traffic and a single Russian controlled currency in the city as the price for the lifting of the 100-day-old Berlin blockade. This proposal is termed "unsatisfactory."

Meanwhile Berlin's city government told 200 occupying powers today that they should get out of Berlin if they cannot settle their differences. A Russian-controlled newspaper said that, if the western powers force the United Nations to debate the Berlin crisis, "a wedge will be driven into the United Nations which may split the entire world organization."

Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin of Britain, in a blistering attack on the Soviet Union, said today that the Russians alone would be responsible for a new world war. United Nations General Assembly cheered Bevin at the close of Britain's major policy speech in one of the greatest demonstrations in United Nations history. He spoke to the Assembly as the three western powers turned their Berlin dispute over to the Security Council.

Meanwhile it was suggested that Russia might use the double veto to prevent admission to the Security Council of the Berlin quarrel. A high eastern delegate to the United Nations made the suggestion.

### Berlin Plane on Alaska Run

SEATTLE (CP)—An Alaska Air Lines DC-4 is scheduled to leave here tonight for Anchorage, Alaska, with the first in a series of emergency food shipments. It is one of the Berlin airlift planes withdrawn from that service to carry supplies of foodstuffs and clothing urgently needed in Alaska as well as machine replacement parts.

### ATTEMPT ON BEN-GURION

TEL AVIV (CP)—Rumor circulated here today that an unsuccessful attempt had been made against the life of Premier David Ben-Gurion of Israel. Ben-Gurion, a member of the government said, had been threatened by Jewish terrorists.

### ASSIZE COURT SESSION OPENS

Fall session of Assize Court opened here this morning before Mr. Justice N. W. Whitaker with two cases comprising the criminal docket. The first case, against James Howard Foster, of Smithers, charged with obtaining money under false pretences, began this morning.

The Crown alleges that Foster obtained \$1,640 from Zinje Utsumiyo, a Japanese, between August 18 and August 27, 1947 in an attempt to defraud. The prosecution is being conducted by T. W. Brown.

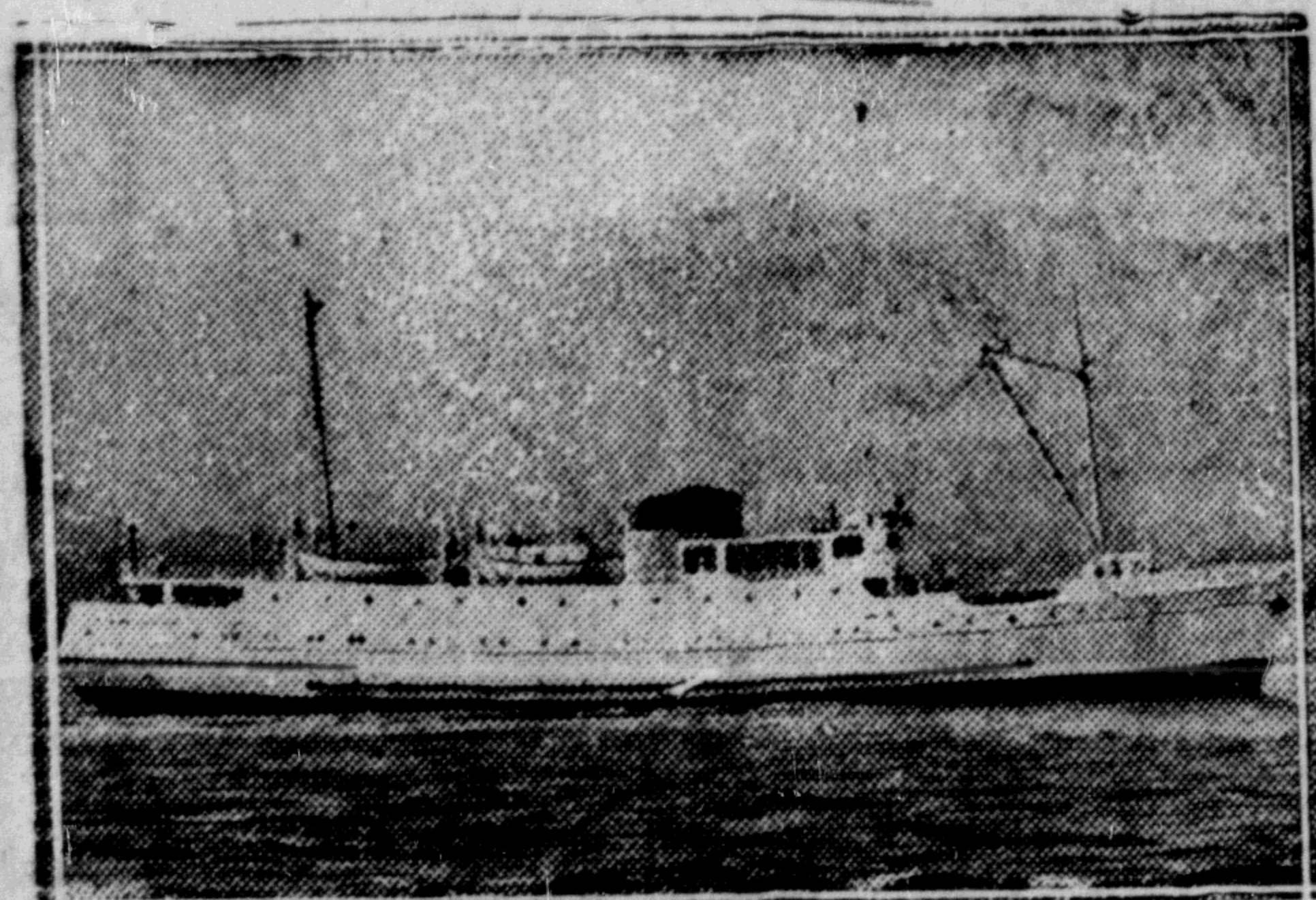
Foster, who appeared without counsel, pleaded not guilty and told the court he was prepared to conduct his own defence.

Following selection of the jury, the case was adjourned until 1:30 this afternoon when the trial was to begin.

### PROVINCES ON FREIGHT CASES

Federal Cabinet at Ottawa Hears Their Appeal Today

OTTAWA (CP)—Appealing to the cabinet against last spring's 21 per cent freight rate increase, seven provincial governments today attacked the rate award as wrong in general principle and on many specific points.

In a joint submission all the provinces but Ontario and Quebec asked the Governor-in-Council to throw out the award or send it back to the Board of Transport Commissioners with orders that it re-examine particular aspects. A third alternative proposal was that the cabinet itself revise the judgment.

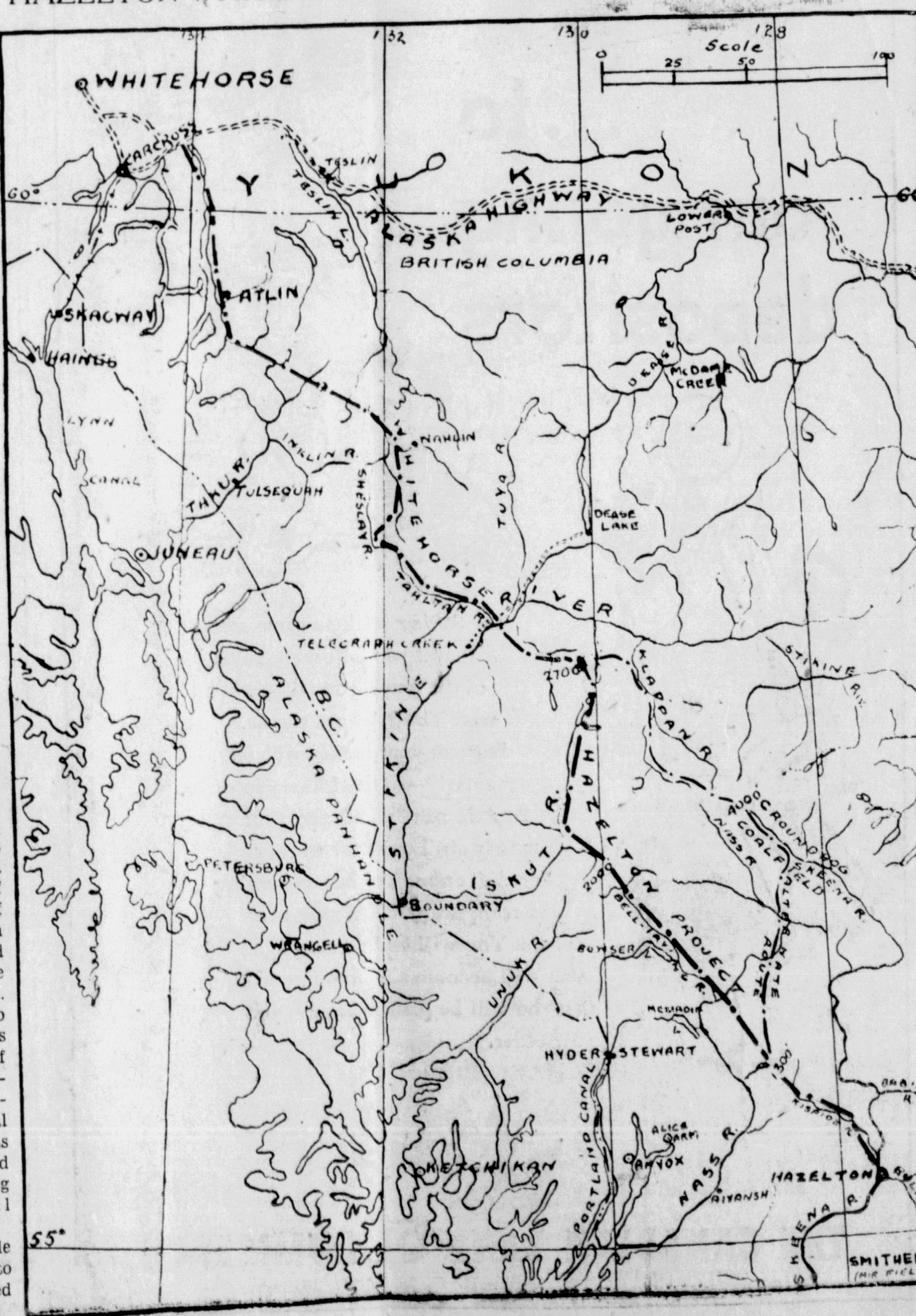
**B.C. IS LEADING**

### HAZELTON-WHITEHORSE HIGHWAY ROUTE



APPROVED AT JUNEAU —Here is the Hazelton-Whitehorse route for a highway to connect the northern trans-provincial highway with the Alaska Highway, construction of which was urged at the annual convention last week of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia and Affiliated Chambers of Commerce of Southeastern Alaska. This route was held to be highly advantageous from a standpoint of easy grade and construction and the convention saw it as a vital defence link as well as opening up a vast and rich territory, including the Groundhog coal field. Its proximity to the Alaska Panhandle for connecting links to the coast was also cited as an advantage.
