Harry McLean, master of the Chilcotin, his officers and crew, and to the management of the Union Steamship Co. for the "unsurpassed" courtesy and service which had been so generously and delightfully rendered. Capt. McLean and Frank Skinner, general agent at Prince Rupert, responded briefly.

During the voyage a sum of \$42.30 was raised by Capt. McLean through various means for the B.C. Cancer Fund. This brought the grand total amount raised for the Cancer Fund from among passengers on the summer cruises of the Chilcotin to \$319.12.

The Chilcotin was back in Prince Rupert at 9:30 Saturday night and, with immigration and customs officers, co-operating helpfully and expeditiously, the passengers were ashore in record time. Prince Rupert people heading for home while the interior delegates prepared to leave Sunday morning by highway for Terrace, Hazelton, Smithers, Telkwa, Burns Lake, Vanderhoof, Prince George and other points whence they came.

On Saturday a four-and-a-half hour stop at Ketchikan permitted the delegates, for many of whom it was the first visit, to see around the "First City" or to make calls. They were favorably impressed with the thriving southeastern Alaska metropolis and close neighbor of Prince Rupert, which having had one of the most profitable salmon canning and fishing seasons in years and with prospects bright for the early establishment of a pulp mill close by, is enjoying an era of prosperity just now such as it has not experienced for the last few years. Despite pouring rain, coming after one of the driest summers on record, a specially-arranged drive to nearby points of interest was enjoyed by several of the passengers.
