GENERAL MOTORS DEFEAT CO-OP

First Encounter of Season Last Night in Fastball League
A nine-inning hitting barrage by General Motors kept Co-op off balance and resulted in the garage boys taking a 14 to 7 victory from the fishermen in their first encounter of the fastball season at Gyro Park last night. It was one of those one-sided games which seem to be characteristic of both General Motors and the league-topping 99 Taxi team. C.N.R.A. has shown similar, but not as conclusive strength on occasion. The victory was General Motors third of the season, lifting their percentage of wins two notches above C.N.R.A. but still well under the unblemished mark set so far by 99 Taxi.

SHORT STORY

Protests against the high cost of living are becoming commonplace but when even baseball umpires complain Max (Fort William Times-Journal) Ray thinks it's time to sit up and take notice. When umpires in the Lakehead Baseball Association failed to get much attention when they complained about low wages they went on strike.

It was all very legal, Ray reports, with the umpire-in-chief first informing the Association by letter that his staff was no longer willing to toil on the diamond for the regular fee of \$3.50 each per game. When the deadline passed and the letter had brought no response, the umpires failed to show up for scheduled games. Substitute officials were found but, eventually a meeting between the Association and the regular umpiring staff was called.

"Out of a welter of recrimination, denunciation and general name-calling by most of the parties concerned," Ray records, "the umpires agreed to accept an increase to \$5 for the official at the plate with the fee for the man on bases remaining at \$3.50." It all goes to prove, Ray feels, that umpires are not people one should buck on the diamond or off.

BIG FIGHT TONIGHT

All Set For World's Heavyweight Championship Battle at New York

NEW YORK — Given a break in the weather, bulky fighter Joe Louis will defend his heavyweight championship against Jersey Joe Walcott tonight in what will mark the end of a boxing era. This intriguing prospect, the last ring appearance of a great champion or an upset victory by the old south Jersey campaigner, is expected to lure 55,000 people to the Yankee Stadium.

Odds favoring Louis stand at 5 to 12 and may drop to 1 to 2 by ringtime due to an influx of Walcott money.

Both fighters are 34 which is old as fighters go. Louis weighs 215 pounds and Walcott tips the scale at 194.

Receipts are expected to reach \$800,000 to \$900,000 with a television take on top of that.

Dr. J. L. Moreno, psychiatrist, picks Louis to win by a knockout in the early rounds.

Louis is rated as the superior puncher and, if he can make Walcott fight his kind of fight, he should catch him early.

Otherwise, a long fight might get Louis' legs in which case Walcott would stand a chance.

Although it was threatening again this morning, the weather bureau predicts clearing weather tonight about the time Joe Louis and Joe Walcott climb through the ropes for the 15-round bout. If the weather is adverse the fight will be further postponed until tomorrow night.
