## EASTERN DRIVER COMING HERE FOR PUBLICITY MEDAL.

A resident of Jersey City, New

## HIGHER RATES, TAX BOOST

penditure and of the known in-  
crease in revenue amounts to  
about \$25,000, and falls short by  
\$12,159 of repaying the proposed  
indebtedness, disregarding en-  
tirely any profit from operation  
of the telephone system," the  
report states.

"It is, therefore, apparent," it  
continues, "that the only solution  
of the problem is an increase in  
existing rates.

Revision of rates to a level as  
proposed by the B. C. Telephone  
Co. which is currently trying to  
standardize its rate structure,  
would result in the following in-  
creases:

Proposed	Present
Rate	Rate
Business, main line	\$5.75 \$3.75
Business, party line	\$4.00 \$2.75
Residential main line	\$3.00 \$2.75
Residential party line	\$2.75 \$1.75

Current rates quoted are for  
wall telephones and varying sur-  
charges apply on all other types  
of instruments. In the case of  
the proposed rate, the charges  
would be for wall or desk mono-  
phones.

The committee also has con-  
sidered retaining the present  
gross rates but reducing the dis-  
count from \$1.00 monthly to  
either 50 or 25 cents.

On the basis of present con-  
nected equipment, totalling about  
2200 telephones, plus the 277 for  
which applications have been  
made, the net amount received  
annually would be:

B. C. Telephone scale: \$95,451.  
Present rate with 50 cent dis-  
count: \$85,200.

Present gross rate with 25 cent  
discount: \$92,256.

"Bearing in mind that our new  
borrowings will probably have  
to amount to nearly \$556,000, it  
appears definite that the rate  
structure with the 50 cent dis-  
count will not suffice, and that  
for either of the other schemes  
to be workable, it will necessi-  
tate payment of the entire prof-  
its from the system into a fund  
for renewal and replacements as

they become necessary, other-  
wise, at the end of twenty or  
twenty five years, the city will  
again be faced with a major re-  
habilitation problem.

"This will mean that three-  
quarters of the annual net profit  
from the telephone department  
which formerly formed part of  
the general revenue will no  
longer be treated in this way  
and that this loss to the gen-  
eral revenue will have to be off-  
set by an increase in the mill  
rate.

"To make the proposed scheme  
possible, it will be necessary for  
telephone users to pay more for  
the service and for the rate-  
payer to pay additional taxes to  
an amount equivalent to the  
share of the telephone profits he  
had previously enjoyed," the re-  
port concluded.

Telephone profits turned over  
to general revenue ranged from  
a peak of \$16,316 in 1943 down  
to \$5,938 in 1947, the decrease  
being caused by rising operating  
costs and increased maintenance  
for the worn out system.
