of the Legion was well epitomized in this fine new building. The colonel then reminisced on leading the first contingent away from Prince Rupert—"as fine a body of men as ever stood in shoe leather." Right to the field he had led them through desperate and violent situations, through the grim days of France and Flanders, and they had never let him down. "They were a credit to you people of Prince Rupert—and to Canada." "Always stand by the good old Legion. It needs your help."

As the colonel was seated, the strains of "Old Soldiers Never Die" spontaneously broke forth and then there were hearty musical honors.

Canon Procter gave the prayer of dedication and Mrs. Margaret Smith, accompanied by Mrs. J. S. Black, sang "Bless This House."

Col. McGregor
Col. McGregor said it was another historic and pleasurable occasion for him. Thirty years ago on a platform up on Acropolis Hill he had been welcomed home by the good citizens of Prince Rupert. He brought forth the gold watch with which he had been presented at that time. "And it keeps good time still let me tell you... Prince Rupert will always be my real home. Col. McGregor acknowledged. Today he saw for it a greater future than had ever been thought. But a place was just as good as its people and, as for this magnificent new building, it would prosper in just such measure as its members, associate members and the citizens generally supported it.

Col. McGregor was called upon to present to William H. Murray, the chairman of the building committee a scroll of adian Legion of merit medal as tokens of appreciation for acknowledgement and a Can-good work. Mr. Murray, on behalf of the committee, accepted and expressed appreciation.

Mayor George Rudderham added a note of congratulation from the city to the Legion. It gave him especial pleasure to take part in the welcome to Col. Peck and Col. McGregor who had brought greater honor to Prince Rupert than had any other two men. The maintaining of the new edifice would be a big job in which he wished the Legion every success.

J. S. Wilson, zone representative, spoke on behalf of the provincial president, B. M. Isman, who was unable to be present but who sent his best wishes and congratulations. The new building was a monument and a memorial.

The undertaking reflected the vision and courage of young men and all who had anything to do with it were worthy of commendation. Its natural setting would be a perpetual inspiration. Mr. Wilson spoke of the ideals and aims of the Legion members in war as in peace—love of home and country and comradeship in spirit. This fine building would not be "just another, beer parlor" even if beer might some times which the Legion was replete, all the way for good deeds with He urged the fullest participation of each and every Legionaire in the work of the organization.

Telegrams of greeting were read from Jack McRae M. L. A.; Dr. R. C. Bamford, the president of the Prince George Legion. Col. A. M. Sparling, B. M. Isman, provincial president; E. T. Applewhite M. P.; president of the Ocean Falls Legion and Russ Davis of Vancouver.

Following the opening proceedings, the gathering repaired to Club 27 for refreshments and informal social enjoyment.

For many it was the first visit to the new premises which were inspected with keen interest and appreciation.
