shék is still in command of an
army of about half a million.
Suppose U.S. naval and air
forces defeat the invasion at-
tempt, as they could easily do.

By that act they would have
entered a war against the new
government of China, which is
already recognized as legal by
governments representing well
over half the people of the
world.

The U.S., by such an act,
would have gone to war with
China—whose Red government
is recognized by India, Pakistan,
Ceylon and by Britain.

THE IMMEDIATE EFFECT
of such an event would be to
draw the whole might of Com-
munist China into the war in
Korea—the only area where
Chinese Red forces could bet
revenge for the American ac-
tion.

What of the general position
of Britain in such an event?
Above all what of the increased
danger to Hong Kong.

Surely the answer is to have
the whole UN, and not just the
U.S.A., say what is to be done
about Formosa.

Before me as I write is a
letter from Formosa telling of
the profound relief with which
the people there got the news
that they were to be protected
by the U.S.A. Why could not UN
let the Formosans decide their
own destiny — by ballots not
bullets?

here Thursday.

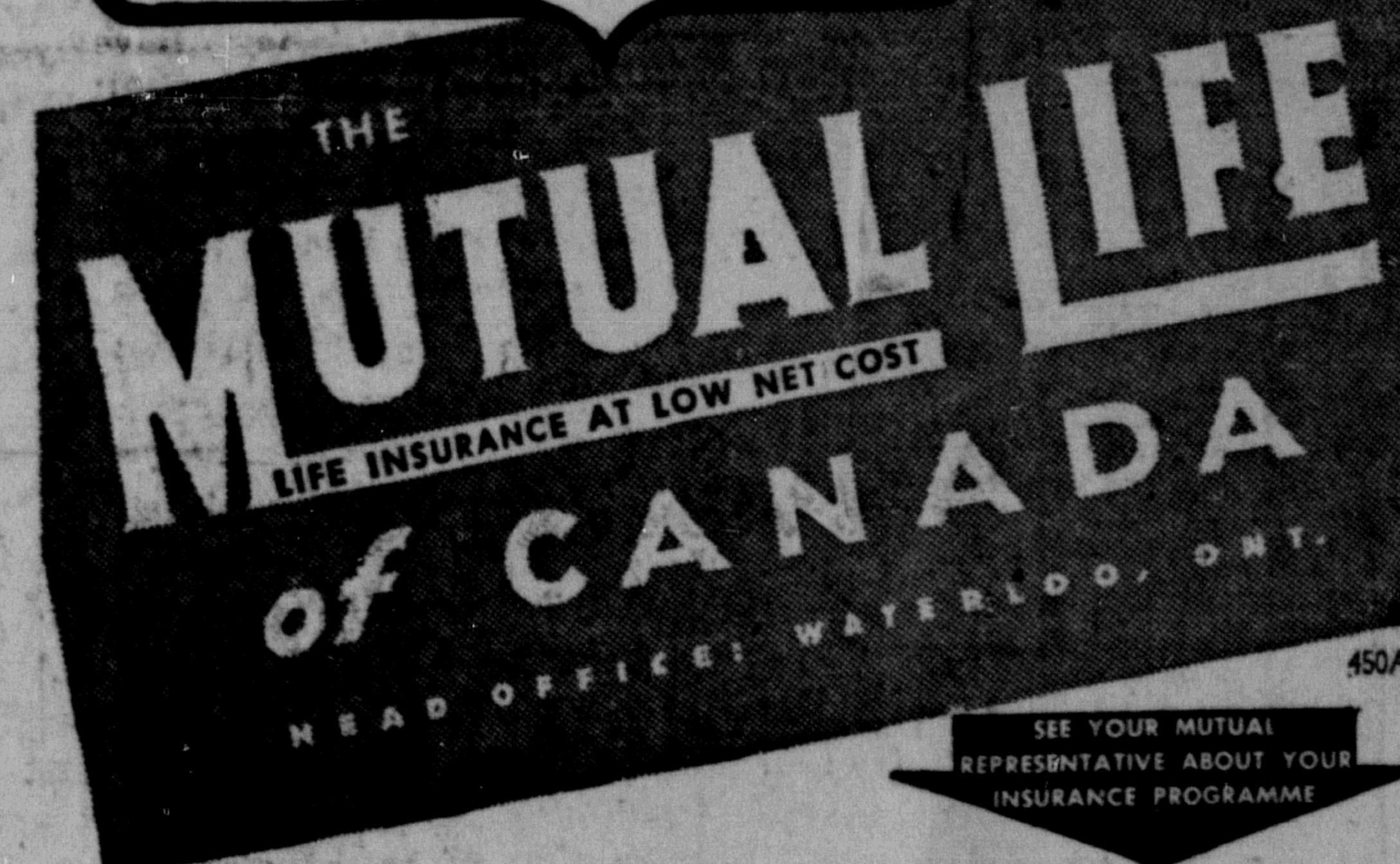
