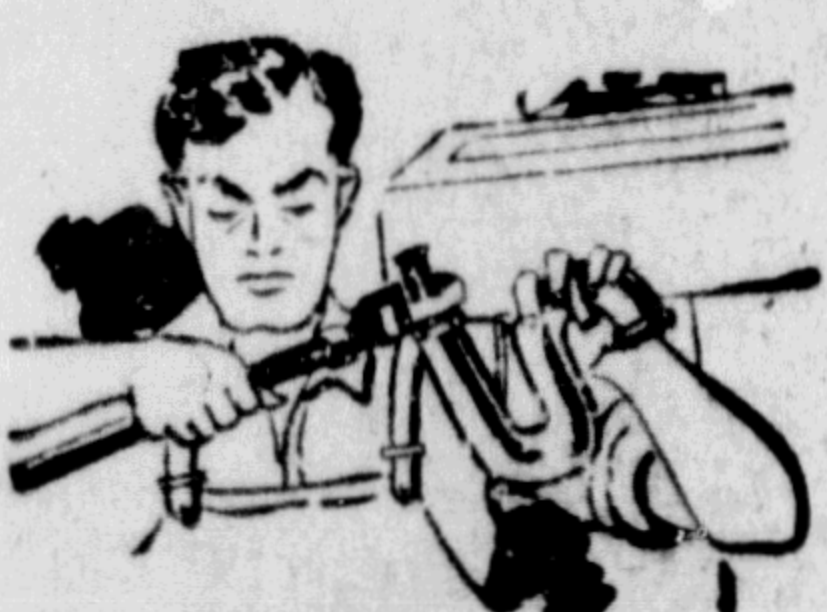

**COUNCIL ADOPTS
AUDIT REPORT**

Net Deficit of \$2,405 In
General Revenue Operations

Prince Rupert had a deficit
of \$2,405 in its general revenue
operations last year but showed
a minute profit on its loan rate,
according to the 1947 auditor's
report adopted by City Council
last night.

The report was accepted with-
out comment by the aldermen
after its approval had been rec-
ommended by Alderman T. B.
Black, finance committee chair-
man.

Total general rate expendi-
tures—used in the normal op-
eration of the city—were \$347,-
199, while gross revenues in the
general rate were \$344,794, leav-
ing a deficit of \$2,405.

School revenues totalled \$80,-
090, while expenditures took an
equal amount from the city cof-
fers.

Revenue from the loan rate
was \$92,868, while expenditures
were \$92,801, leaving a credit of
\$7.74.

General rate revenues were
made up of \$84,593 in tax levies
plus \$1,825 in tax penalties and
\$727 interest on arrears. Utili-
ties grossed \$147,389, of which
the telephone department grossed
\$71,296 and the water de-
partment, \$76,092. The city re-
ceived \$24,283 in provincial gov-
ernment grants.

Total operating expenditures
for the year were \$520,098.

**ASKS RESCISSION
OF LIQUOR BAN**

Ald. Casey Would Let
Oldsters Have Liquor

Claiming that he was "not
the keeper of a penitentiary,"
Alderman George Casey belabored
his colleagues in city council
last night over failure of the
Pioneers' Home committee to
lift the liquor interdiction im-
posed on Home inmates last De-
cember.

He learned that the committee
planned to review the interdic-
tion cases in the near future,
but failed in an attempt to have
council lift the ban forthwith.

The interdiction was imposed
shortly before Christmas on
grounds that some of the elderly
residents had been creating dis-
turbances in the Pioneers' Home
by returning intoxicated or, in
some cases, failing to return at
all.

Alderman Casey spoke after
Alderman Arthur Brooksbank
had delivered a report on the
Pioneers' Home, of which he is
committee chairman, ending
with the comment that the com-
mittee had visited the home last
week and found everything "in
first class condition."

"They not only dictate what
goes on inside the home, but
also what the men do when they
are outside of it," Alderman
Casey retorted.

He moved that the interdic-
tion be immediately rescinded
and the men restored their full
rights as citizens. The motion
failed to find a seconder.

"If Alderman Casey would
change his motion so that coun-
cil might suggest to the Pion-
eers' Home Committee that the
interdiction be rescinded, I
might second it," Alderman Black
said. "I think the committee
