

Triple Fatality In Copper Mine Down the Coast

BRITANNIA BEACH (P) -- A mine accident at this copper mining community has claimed the lives of three men.

The dead are John Oliver, aged 34; Alan Ray Fraser, 20, and Albert Dennis, 20.

The accident occurred when the men climbed on top of some drill steel of different lengths which was being stored from one level to another in a six-foot square cage. One of the steel lengths is believed to have caught on a shaft timber, crushing the three men against other steel bars in the cage.

An inquest is being held today.

SHIPMENTS

Great Britain Takes Precautions Against Export of War Materials

LONDON (P)-Great Britain plans to lend Russia \$36,000,000 for purchase of goods in the United Kingdom but is taking extensive precautions against the shipment of anything of "potential military value" to the Soviet.

Announcing the loan in the House of Commons yesterday, Harold Wilson, president of the Board of Trade, accompanied the new schedule of raw materials and machinery subject to export controls. The items involved might be used as war goods.
