



MRS. CHAPPELL PASSES AWAY

Mrs. Albert D. (Caroline Dorothy) Chappell, formerly of Hazelton and for the past five years a resident of Prince Rupert, passed away Wednesday afternoon in the Prince Rupert General Hospital. The funeral took place this afternoon from the B.C. Undertakers Grenville Court Chapel.

Mrs. Chappell was 59 years old and was a resident of Hazelton for 33 years, until coming to Prince Rupert recently to reside with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Perry York.

With her husband, Mrs. Chappell arrived in Prince Rupert in May, 1915, proceeding to Hazelton, where Mr. Chappell joined the staff of R. S. Sargent Ltd. Mrs. Chappell became well known in the interior, acquiring many friends. She was active in community affairs and being an accomplished pianist, made her services available at social affairs.

Mrs. Chappell was the daughter of the late Henry Schaeke, of New Westminster, arriving there from her birthplace at Baltimore, Maryland with her parents in 1895. Her father owned and operated the Automatic Can Factory at New Westminster and later the Schoole Machine Works in that city and at Vancouver.

In addition to her husband, she is survived by a sister, Mrs. Thomas (Irene) Smith and a brother, Harold Schaeke, both of San Francisco, one daughter, Mrs. Perry (Vivian) York and two grandchildren, Perry, Jr. and Irene York, of Prince Rupert.

Final rites were held this afternoon from Grenville Court Chapel of B.C. Undertakers with Archdeacon E. Hodson of St. Peter's Church, Seal Cove, officiating. Pallbearers were William Anderson, George Howey, John Ovgaard, Murdo MacKenzie, Roy Becker and Otto Quast.

BURIED AT METLAKATLA

George Cunningham, 83-year-old Skeena River pioneer who died in the city Monday, was buried Wednesday afternoon in the historic Metlakatla cemetery at Aural Point where lie his father and uncle who featured in the early history of the north coast.

Metlakatla villagers took the bier to the Cemetery Island opposite the village, after a funeral service attended by a few old friends at B.C. Undertakers' Grenville Court Chapel. Canon Basil S. Proctor conducted the service.

The remains were taken to Metlakatla by the boat Venn Pass II. The marine cortege was made up of Metlakatla boats and the Anglican mission boat Northern Cross, carrying Rev. Charles Lomas who conducted the committal service at the graveside.

At the chapel service, the congregation sang the hymn "Unto the Hills." Mrs. J. C. Gilker was organist.

Pallbearers were friends from Metlakatla.

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SHIPS AND WATERFRONT

This is the 101st voyage of the Union steamer Coquitlam since she was converted from a Castle Class corvette and entered the coastal service nearly two years ago. The vessel, like her sister ships Camosun and Chilcotin, has now become a popular institution on the coast. The Coquitlam, in command of Capt. Alf Aspinall, arrived in port at 1 o'clock this afternoon from Vancouver and sails at 10 o'clock tonight for Masset Inlet points whence she will return here or Sounday southbound.

Capt. Alex McLean, veteran master mariner of this coast and formerly in command of the steamer Camosun, is back on the run again after having been ashore in Vancouver since last fall suffering from a severe illness from which he is now largely recovered. He is being welcomed back by many old friends. At present he is holding down the chief officership on the steamer Catala.

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
