If the soil is muddy and sticks to his boots then he finds other jobs indoors. But if the soil is damp but doesn't squeeze tightly together it is just right to cultivate. And this rule holds good whether the winter snows have just gone or after a heavy spring shower.

As a general rule a fairly evenly balanced mixture is best for the average garden. With natural fertilizers or manures there are differences too. Well-rooted cow manure is probably the best, as it is well-balanced. Any kind, however, will be useful, but because it is so strong poultry manure should be used sparingly.

Another excellent source of plant food will be the compost heap. Every garden, no matter how small, should have one. This is a hidden spot where all vegetables refuse is piled, stuff like weeds, grass clippings, straw, leaves, even garbage, provided it is free from tin cans and glass inch or so layer of the plant
