TRAGIC PAIN

Editor, Daily News:

Many friends of the late James Edward MacLean have expressed

deep regret at his tragic passing under pressure of pain from that dreaded disease — cancer.

Provision should be made for the care and keep of persons suffering from incurable diseases. Victims of such maladies should not be left alone in the wilderness of despair.

In a Christian country where life and conduct are supposed to be patterned from the Golden Rule of Jesus Christ I can recall from my personal recollection no less than sixteen persons between Prince Rupert, Stewart and Alice Arm who, during the past 35 years, have resorted to extreme measures under the pressure of hopeless pain. At the same time drugs designed to relieve pain were held under lock and key by the medical profession, the key to the pain killer being hard cash which, unfortunately, some of us have not got.

Nevertheless, in spite of perpetual pain and agony, we have witnessed some unbelievable deeds of forbearance and fortitude. One victim went so far as to dig his own grave, make and paint his own coffin, then

sending to a mail order house for a rifle and shells and rope necessary to lower his remains into the grave. Painting his house and weeding his garden, his last chore of the day was to end his own life and thus secure release from the pain he had endured so long.

The question I endeavour to place before you, Mr. Editor, is: Who is responsible, the person who commits the act of suicide or the conditions that compel the act?

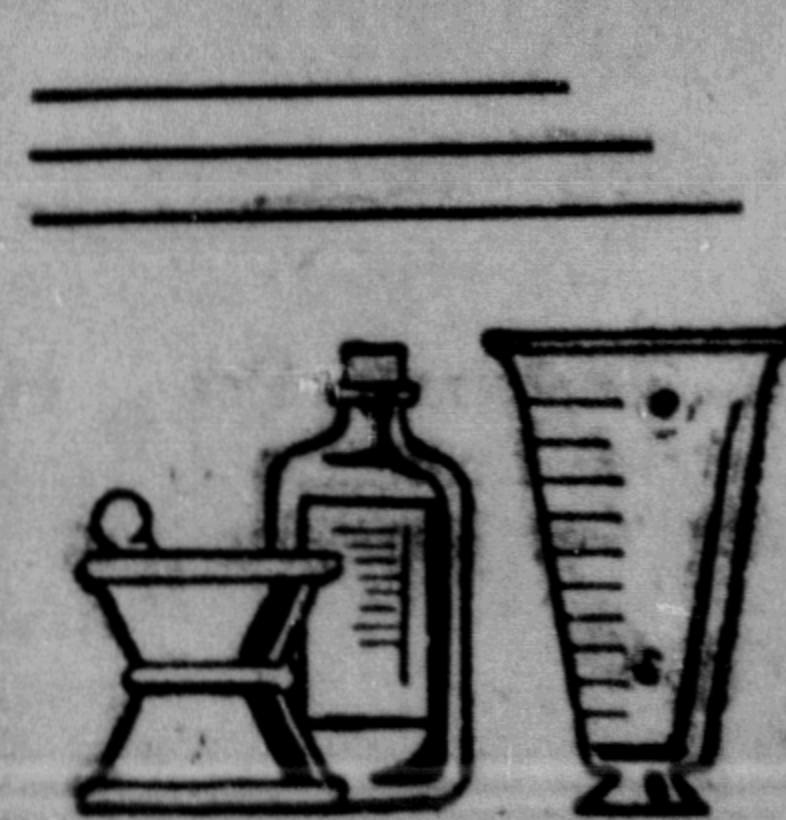
