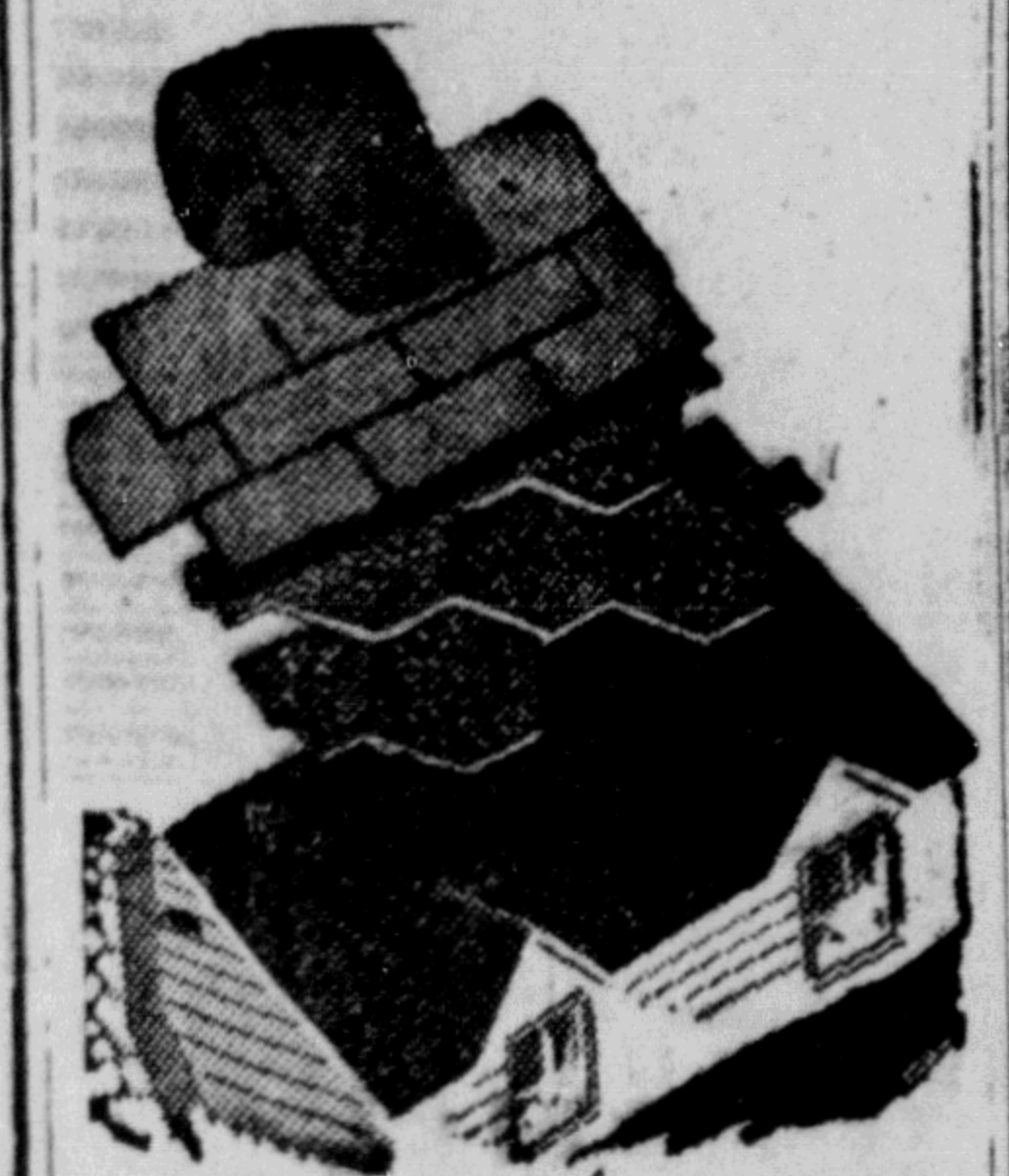

BASEBALL—

Watson Islanders Redeem Themselves - Nearly Won

It looked more like a baseball game last night as
Watson Island held Abel & Odowes to a single run
win in the Senior League.

Bill Robinson, on the mound for the Islanders
going into the ninth inning, had an even chance of
winning a game. The score was tied 5-5. Pavlikis

singled, stole second and moved
to third on an overthrow. Pav-
likis, on a long chance of steal-
ing home on the pitch, was near-
ly there when Dan met the ball
and sent it toward first base.

McDonald for the Islanders bolted
like a deer but even at that
could not get to the ball before
it reached the ground. In a de-
perate dive with hand out-
stretched he managed to get his
glove under the ball inches
above the ground and hold it.

It would have been the play of
the game if he had remembered
in the excitement to lob it to
third to make the double on
Pavlikis.

With one down and Pavlikis
on third, Robinson threw Lind-
say. Lambie followed with a fly
direct to right fielder, who muffed
it. Pavlikis scored on the play
to put the game on ice for
Abel & Odowes at 6-5. Dunbar

went down swinging to retire his
side. The Islanders were retired
one-two-three to end in defeat.

Robinson pitched a wonderful
game throughout and with any
backing in the field at all would
have won. Robinson also collect-
ed three of his team's eight hits

and one of its five runs.

The earlier innings were good
baseball to watch and the final
decision on who would win had
to wait until the last Watson
Islander went down on a play
from pitcher to first.

UMPIRE IS REAL FINE
Umpire behind the bat was
Edward A. Nolan, who played
for Edmonton against Prince
Rupert. He recalls they had to
wait around here a week before
the weather gave them a break.

Mr. Nolan worked in the ship-
yards here during the war but
did not take to baseball. In last
night's game he won the respect
of fans and players alike with
his quick and fair decisions.

Abel & Odowes scored first in
the first half of the first inning
but Watson Island tied it. Abel
& Odowes scored again in the
third, and Watson Island came
back with three to give them a
two run lead, which they held
until Abel & Odowes tied it in
the fifth. Abel & Odowes col-
lected another in the sixth and
maintained the advantage until
the bottom half of the seventh
when Magnus crossed the plate
to tie the game at 5-5. Both
teams remained scoreless in the
eighth. The game was lost in the
ninth on two errors and one hit.

Sport Shots

Monday night's Senior football
game, in which Canadian Legion
and General Motors tied one all,
was a splendidly contested game.

Krause did well in goal. Sun-

but had their hands full check-
ing an improved Motors attack
in spells. Yelland was very re-
sourceful and effective. McAfee

continues to improve and uses
his height to advantage. Greer
was clever in positional play and
in placing the ball. Johansen
did well when he replaced Mc-
Afee. The forward line was fast,
clever and aggressive. Armstrong
and Murray were a dangerous
wing and gave Price quite a time.

Baxter was fast and neat and
Aird showing nice touches too.
Smith drove hard but found Ol-
son difficult to beat. The Legion
has not lost a game this season.

Boulter again saved a well-
taken penalty kick. He gave a
fine display. Robinson was
steady and kicked well but is
inclined to hang on to the ball.

Wellens was in great form using
his height and speed to advan-
tage and tackling with vigor.
Olson was a stand-out being
very fast and aggressive. Price
did much better at centre-for-
ward in the second half. John

Wilson found Baxter fast and
tricky but defended hard and
even had a shot at goal. Hor-
nell got a good goal and deserved
another. He did well at half-
back in the second half. Ford

was very fast and clever. Pat
Wilson was also very fast and
persistent. Magee turned in a
much-improved game. Letour-
neau is improving and only needs
more experience. Whyte was
better too. Large did well.

After a fast opening Hornell
put the General Motors a goal up
on a close-in shot that Krause
reached but could not stop. The
Motors were pressing and Hor-
nell headed the ball against the
upright with Krause beating but
the ball came back into play.

The Legion broke away and
Smith was just wide. Sunberg
cleared strongly and Armstrong
went very close for Murray's
centre. In a Legion attack while
Boulter was waiting to field the
ball referee Forman's whistle

sounded for a goal and although
the Motors protested strongly,
the referee awarded a goal to
the Legion and the game was
tied up. Olson handled the ball
but Boulter brought off a splen-

did save from Smith's hard pen-
alty shot. Baxter made a clever
run but Robinson intervened.
McAfee stopped a Motors attack
and then Baxter headed. Mur-
ray's cross just wide. Price was
unable to cope with the Arm-
strong-Murray combination and
many centres went across. Bak-
ter took a perfect corner-kick
that finished in Boulter's hands.

Olson headed away in a Legion
attack and Ford just missed
from Pat Wilson's pass. Price
shot just wide from Magee's pass
and the Legion had difficulty
getting Pat Wilson's well-taken
corner away. Then play flashed
to the other end and Murray's
cross asked for conversion but
no one connected. Johansen re-
placed McAfee and was good.

Murray's corner was dangerous.
Price tested Krause who saved
and Murray hit the upright from
close range. Motors pressed
steadily and Pat Wilson just
missed from Price's pass. Then
the Legion staged a fierce attack
but the Motors defence held with
Wellens and Robinson doing a

big job. Boulter caught Smith's
header. Greer and Eby had an
interesting bout with Pat Wilson
and Hornell with honors about
even. Magee and Price were
nearly through but Sunberg
saved. Price drove just wide and
Olsen had a long drive that
Krause did well to save. But no
further goals were scored and a
one-all draw was the result.
