CELERY RELISH
 Chop 4 green peppers, 4 sweet red peppers and 2 lbs. (12 medium) onions. Combine $\frac{1}{2}$ cup salt, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup mustard seed and 1 teaspoon turmeric.
