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

Cover and Immediately pour back into remain cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Do not ing hot mixture over boiling water; blend thoroughly, Cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; add butter, lemon juice and rind. Cool to

room temperature without stir-Pour into baked pie shell. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry; gradually beat in sugar. Spread meringue lightly on filling. Bake in moderate (325°F.) 15 to browned.

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
