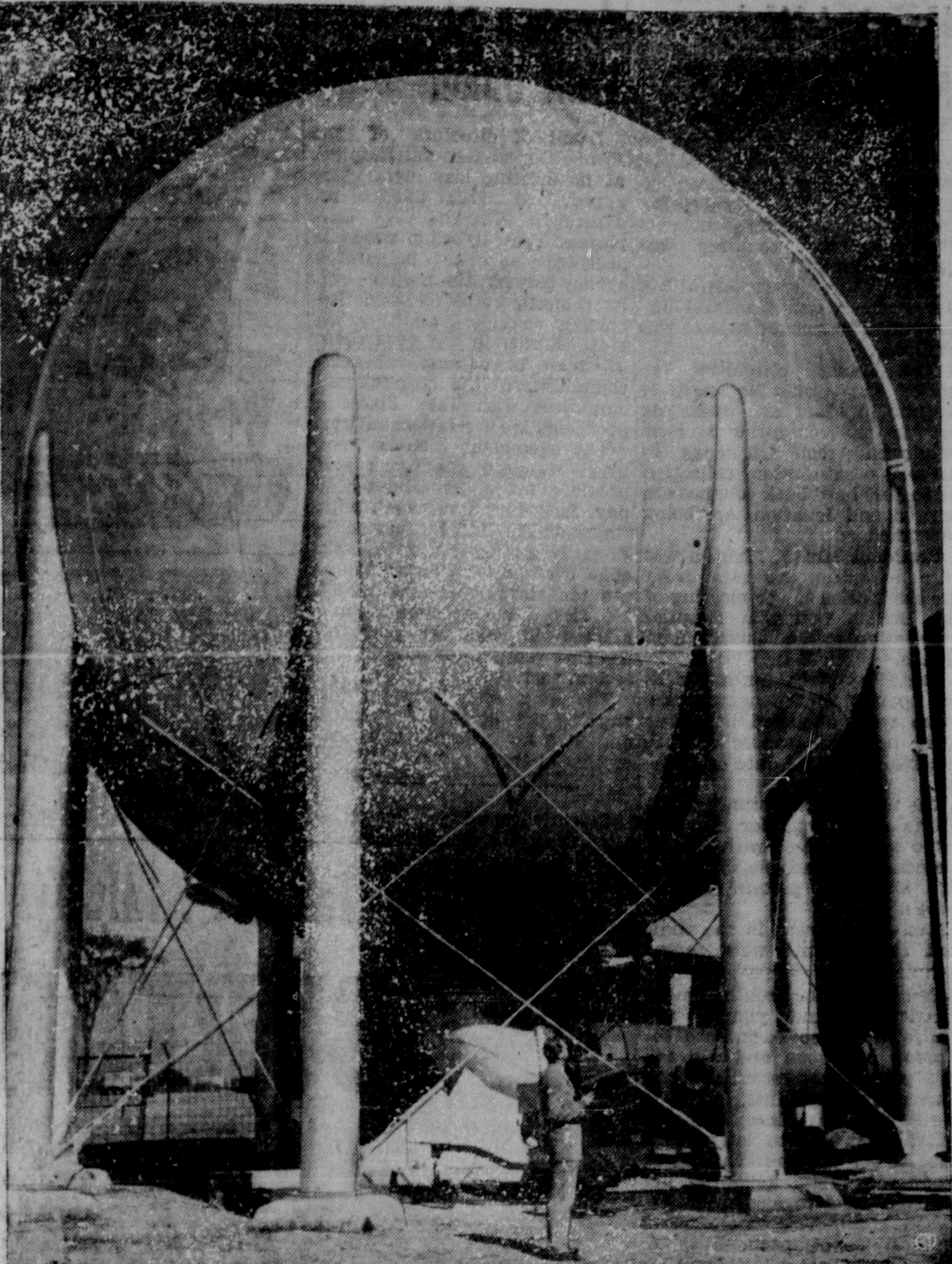

**CHIANG IS NOT
CHINA**

LESTER PEARSON'S astute intervention, at the opening of the United Na-tions Assembly, gives the world organization a sec-ond chance to avoid an unwise and even disas-trous decision.

If the United Nations is to sur-vive on the basis of which it was formed, China's seat soon must go to the government of China. There is only one government of China—and every honest person admits it. That government is the Communist administration which has its capital in Peking and not the refugee rump of Chiang Kai-Shek.

INDIA SEEMED TO ME TO make an unanswerable case for the seating of Communist China. The government is strong, stable, and is not even challenged on the vast mainland of China. It is already recognized as the gov-ernment by over 95% of the people of China, the vast major-ity of whom, by the way, are not Communists.

The Chinese Communist gov-ernment is officially recognized as such by all its neighbors in Asia, including India, Pakistan, Ceylon, Indonesia, Burma, Siam. It is recognized by the majority of the members of the UN Se-curity Council—including Brit-ain. That is, well over half the world's population has accepted the new Chinese government as a fact.

The only reason why 43 out of the 58 members of the UN have not yet recognized the Communist government of China is because the United States has not done so. Very few nations can afford to make any move today which offends the U.S.A. And on this question of China the N.S.A. is itself divided.

IT IS WIDELY believed that Dean Acheson himself and the U.S. State Department would like to recognize the Chinese gov-ernment immediately. Those who hold this view believe that Pres-ident Truman also agrees. But General MacArthur and a strong wing of the Republican party have other ideas. Hence the extreme importance

of the re-appointment to the United States cabinet of General George C. Marshall. The latter has had long and successful ex-perience in keeping General Mac Arthur in his proper place—that is as a general and not an inter-national policy maker. Marshall knows the Chinese picture at first hand.

THE REAL TOUGH NUT TO crack in the Chinese mix-up is the island of Formosa. This was returned to Chinese sovereignty after the recent war (though the Formosans themselves were never consulted about this, else they might have voted for in-dependence). When Chiang's corrupt and demoralized gov-ernment was driven out of China, he took refuge on For-mosa. He has no less than 750,000 troops there, of whom about 400,000 are rated as first class. Hence both Chiang Kai-Shek on Formosa and the Chinese Communists agree that Formosa is part of China. Chiang has every intention of using it as a hide-out till he is strong enough to regain a foothold on the Asiatic mainland. As the ultra-Conservative London Observer points out it is the above fact which compels the Chinese Communists to attack Formosa.

REGARDLESS of what is done about Formosa—there is only one government of China. Like it or lump it, that government is the Communist government. The recognition of that gov-ernment is, as Trygve Lie, the Sec-etary of the UN points out, a most important point in starting the world back in the direction of peace. Chiang is not China.

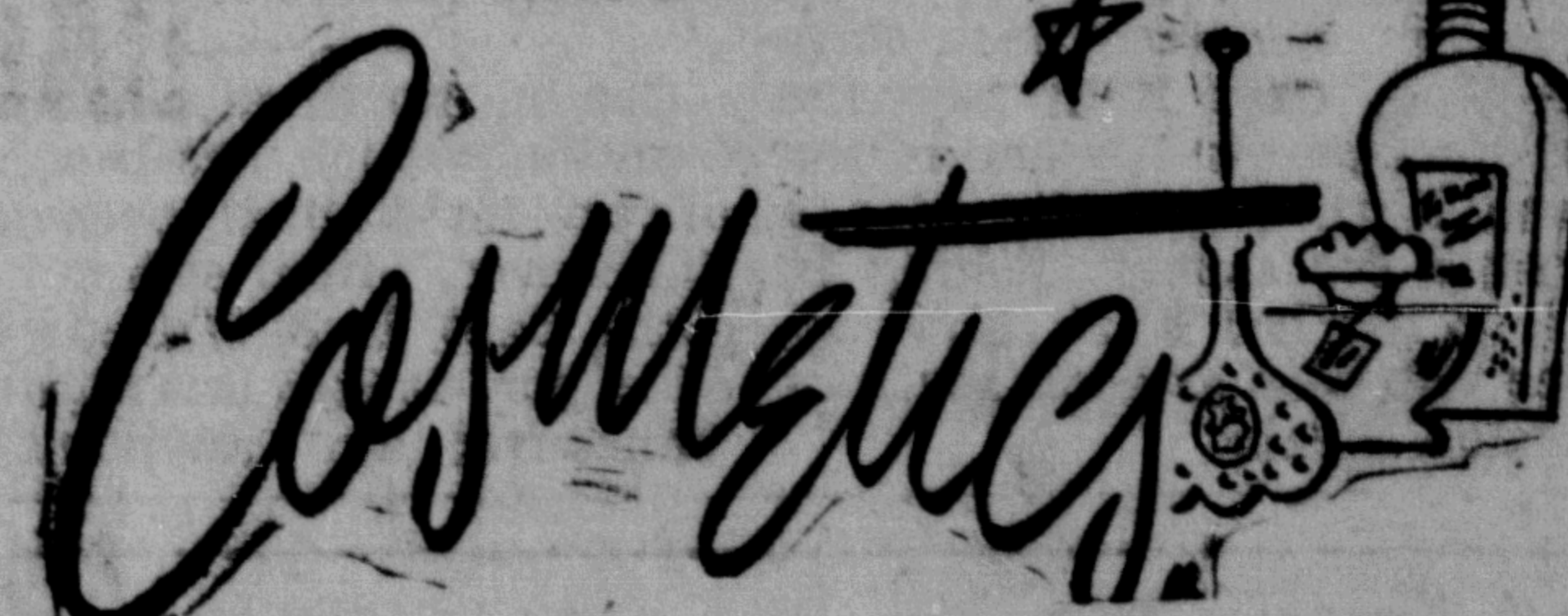

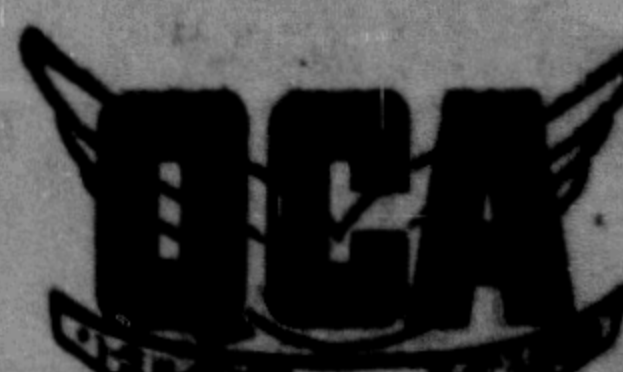
