TORONTO -The Toronto Telegram says today in a dispatch from Moose Factory that Indians and white residents of fur trading communities on James Bay are in a state of fearful excitement because of a series of weird events for which they know no reasonable explanation.

The events have included, says the story, appearance of a waterborne object which the Indians insist was a submarine strange red light in the sky, appearance of a large airplane accompanied by a smaller one and three huge explosions like earthquakes inland from the coast last March. They also reported strange white men who ran to hide in the forest when seen by Indians around Fort George.

THE GEOPOLITICS OF KOREA

Neatly placed at the intersection point of Japan, China and Russia, Korea plays a part in twentieth-century Asia not unlike that of Belgium in eighteenth and nineteenth century Europe, when it was the meeting-place and battle-ground of Britain, France and Germany. In Japanese hands in 1931 Korea was the jumping-board for the conquest of Manchuria; in Russian hands it might have been the same again, while an independent Korea, controlling the sea connections between Vladivostok and Port Arthur, makes Russia's hold on this Manchurian port precarious. For this reason, China has a strong and real interest in keeping Korea out of Russian hands. Japan has an even stronger interest: Korea in the hands of a continental Great Power would be a pistol pointed at Japan's heart. Moreover, Korea has always been Japan's rice-bowl, and one of her chief customers for industrial goods. A united and independent Korea is in the long run an indispensable condition of peace and stability in this highly explosive area.

SEOUL ()-The North Korean government announced by radio tonight that it had moved its capital to Sinuiji, one mile south of Yalu River on the border of Manchuria. The announcement cleared up the mystery as to the whereabouts of the North Korean president, Kim II Sung, and his ministers since fleeing from the old capital of Pyongyang.

PYONGYANG- Allied forces. pushing north following the capture of this Red Korean capital, linked up with the American parachute forces which were dropped yesterday and United States Army headquarters said today that there is no possibility now of the North Koreans putting up further organized resistance. General Douglas MacArthur had said yesterday that the war was very definitely coming to an end.

The parachute troops which had been dropped Friday in the Sunchon-Sukchow area, linked forces with the United States First Cavalry men over a 30mile stretch between fallen Pyongyang and Sunchon,

General MacArthur's headquarters said fast-moving paratroopers had sealed off 28,000 Communist Koreans after cascading behind the enemy lines. The trapped Reds are nearly half the organized Communist fighting' force left north of the 38th parallel.

All arteries of escape are blocked for the North Korean Reds in the Sunchon-Sukchon area where 4200 United States airborne troops dropped out of

The surprise manoeuvre left an estimated 63,000 Communist troops in North Korea unable to mass for any effective stand against the onrushing United Nations forces. There is no sign of any organized defence line north of the present battle zone. Resistance in Pyongyang is petering out as American tanks

enter the fallen city. There is no indication that General MacArthur plans to foreign United Nations troops to the Manchurian bo:der where an incident might involve Russian or Chinese Communist troops.
