The vexed question of who is the beneficiary of the insurance policy should the building burn down was aired with Commissioner Haugland stating that the village, as owners of the property, would be the beneficiary. However, it was well understood that, in such an event as the building being destroyed by fire, a public meeting would be called to decide what would be done with the insurance and there was no doubt but it would go for a new c.vic centre.

The retiring secretary, Mrs. C. R. Newhouser, was accorded a hearty vote of thanks and appreciation for her services during the past three years.


