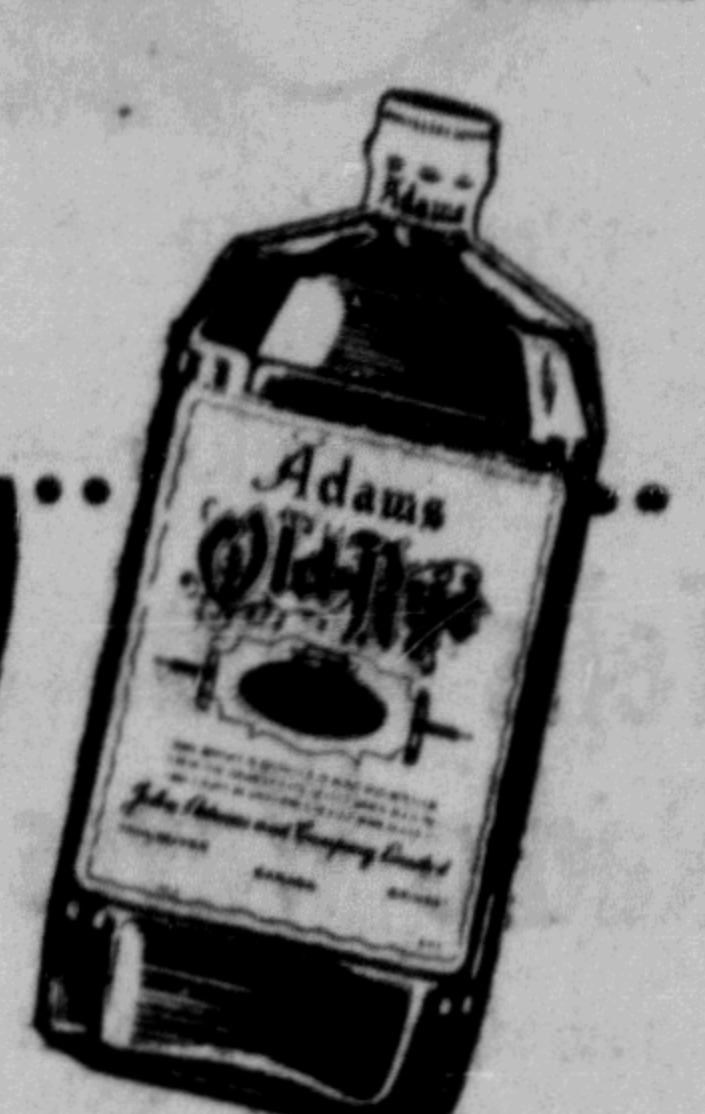


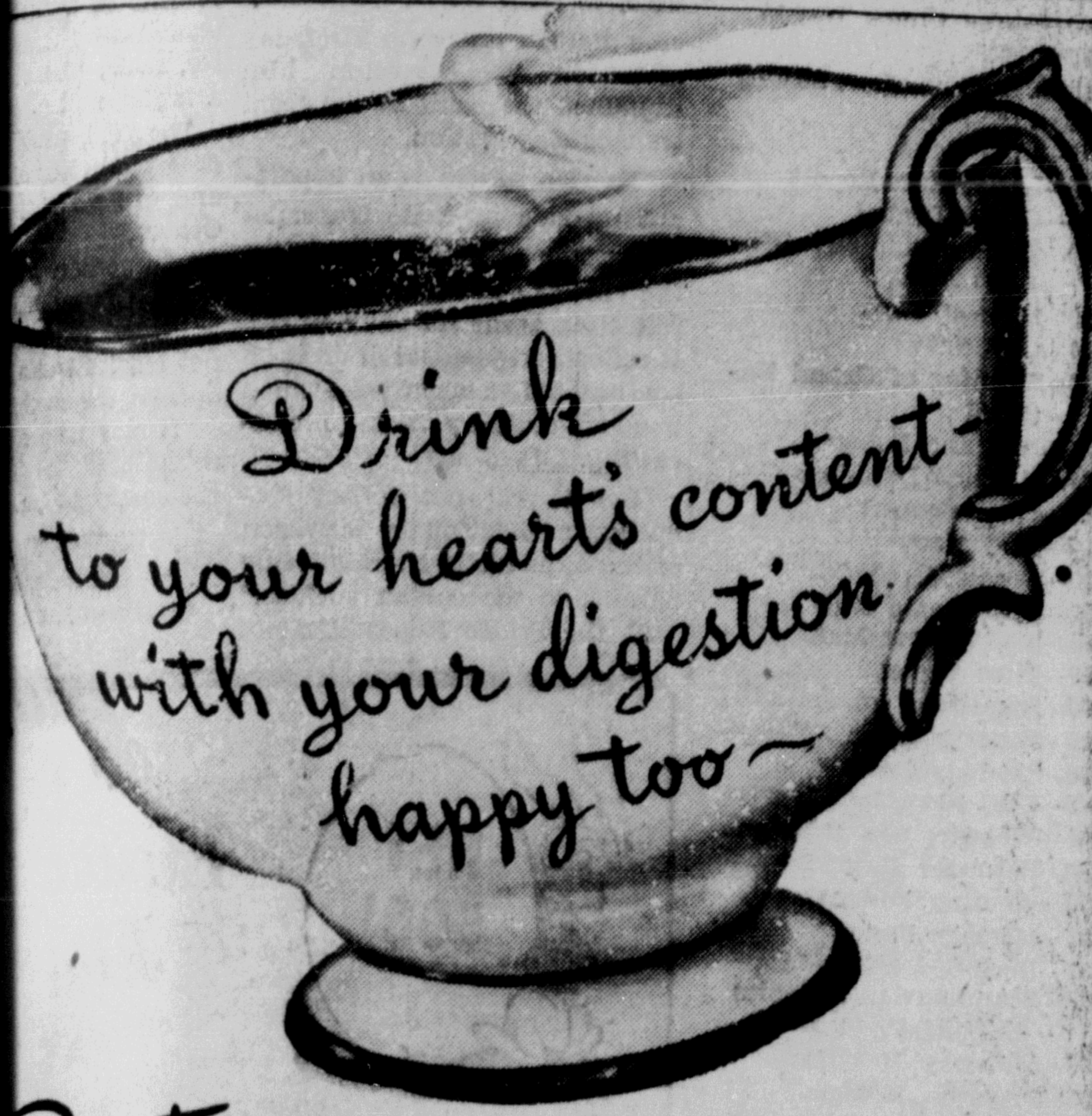
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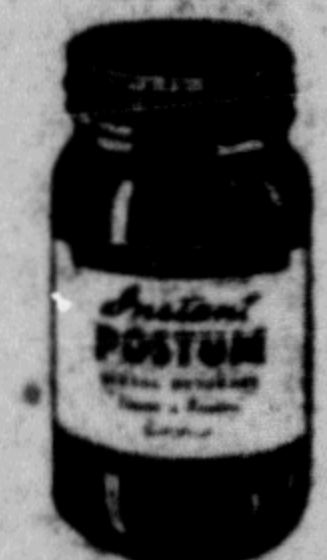

Terrace Civic Centre— Much Done Last Year

**Alf Yoxall Re-Appointed
Director**
TERRACE—Following the elec-
tion of officers at Wednesday
night's meeting of the Terrace
Civic Centre Association, it was
decided to accept the application
of Alf Yoxall for the position of
managing director of the Civic
Centre at the same salary as be-
fore. The secretary was in-
structed to get in touch with him
immediately and have him back
on the job which he started
nearly three years ago and from
which he resigned 15 months
ago.

Success was reported in all the
year's activities of the Associa-
tion at the third annual meet-
ing which was held in the bowling
alleys. B. R. Dodds presided
over the well attended meeting
at which the committee reports
were presented. Many repairs
and improvements had been
made outside and inside the
building, entailing considerable
expense. Three hundred chairs
had been purchased for the audi-
torium. A bowling club had been
formed and league games started.
Though there were more teams
entered in the league this year
than last, it was hoped to have
still more. The choral group was
under way and would be ready in
May for a musical production in
conjunction with the Symphony
orchestra. There had only been
one production of the drama
club, results of which had been
very disappointing due to the
old hall.

A recommendation was made
by President Dodds to the in-
coming executive that the first
project should be the installing of a
proper heating system.

The finances of the association
are in a good state, a little over
\$800 still remaining on the bank
loan but everything else being in
the clear.

The president explained what
had been done with regard to the
fire insurance on the building.
It had been paid by the village
commissioners who would be re-
imbursed by the association.
However the commissioners had
donated the money which had
been paid by the Association in
water rates since the centre was
opened. Deducted from the in-
surance premium this left a bal-
ance of \$124.10 still to be paid. In
future, the commissioners will
refund at the end of each year
the money paid in to them by the
association in water rates.

The vexed question of who is
the beneficiary of the insurance
policy should the building burn
down was aired with Commis-
sioner Hougland stating that the
village, as owners of the property,
would be the beneficiary. How-
ever, it was well understood that,
in such an event as the building
being destroyed by fire, a public
meeting would be called to decide
what would be done with the in-
surance and there was no doubt
but it would go for a new civic
centre.

The retiring secretary, Mrs. C.
R. Newhouser, was accorded a
hearty vote of thanks and ap-
preciation for her services during
the past three years.
