LYTTON (CP)-Two trainmen are known to be dead and a third is missing following the plunge of a Canadian National Railways freight engine and tender down a 50east of here.

45 freight cars were derailed.

The dead are Engineer Archie Legg and Fireman C. A. Merrick, both of Kamloops.

Missing is Brakeman G. F. Donley, also of Kamloops, who was riding the engine. The bodies of the engineer

and fireman were recovered. Auxiliary crews, sent from Kamloops, reached the scene of the slide early today and expected to have the line cleared shortly after noon today. Meanwhile, all trains have been diverted.
