TERRACE At the first meeting of the year of the Terrace Board of Trade held in the Oddfellows' Hall, the new president, Duncan Kerr was in the chair, over a fair attendance, it was decided to send six delegates from the local Board to the next meeting of the Associated Boards in Juneau, Alaska.

What City Council Did

Approved sale of the former McKenzie residence, corner of Conrad Street and Ninth Avenue, to Harry A. Nelson, with provision that it be moved from the site by April 15. The house is on the brow of the city sand spit and must be moved before any further quantities of sand can be removed from the pit.

On request from the School Board, voted \$14,000 for expenditures for the board for the month of February.

Gave initial reading to a bylaw transferring title to Conrad Street School to the school board. Under terms of the 1948 agreement with the City Council, Central Housing and Mortgage Corporation turned over

the school to the city for \$5,695. City Council transferred the school to the school board for the same amount.

Adopted a report of the licensing committee authorizing J. G. Warner to enter business as a fuel dealer.

Accepted a report of the Pioneer Home committee advising that Mr. and Mrs. George C. Jackson have been recommended to take charge of the home after consideration of several applications. The post was left open through resignation of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Montchall. The new appointments are effective March 1.

Ordered filed a letter from the federal Deputy Minister of Fisheries advising council that an appropriation had been recommended by the Department of Public Works for construction of a road approach joining the Fairview Bay fishermen's floats with the road built last summer by the city. When the appropriation is approved, the Fisheries Department will so advise the city, the letter said.

Reminiscences By W.J. and Reflections

One in Prince Rupert, one in Ottawa and the third deceased—Sheriff M.M. Stephens, Max Wade and the late Major Charles Halsey. That tells of a little group associated in business on Rupert Road in the early summer of 1909, a good 39 years ago. The Sheriff is still going strong, Wade, in the Federal service, is understood to have been superannuated. Halsey veteran of the First Great War, died in '17, at Procter, near Nelson, victim of tuberculosis contracted at the front in France. And time marches on.

Hipts of potential hostilities were not unknown in and around Prince Rupert prior to August 1914. Indeed, one apprehensive day, the Muskeg Scouts mustered and it looked entirely possible they would take the field somewhere in an Indian war on the terrain between Hole-in-the-Wall and Hagwil-

get. There were no naval movements off Prince Rupert although vessels of His Majesty's fleet and the Canadian Navy (steam-sail era cruiser Egeria) (Ottawa-station Niobe) would sail in from time to time, look around and sail away again, this being merely a gesture, and without significance.
