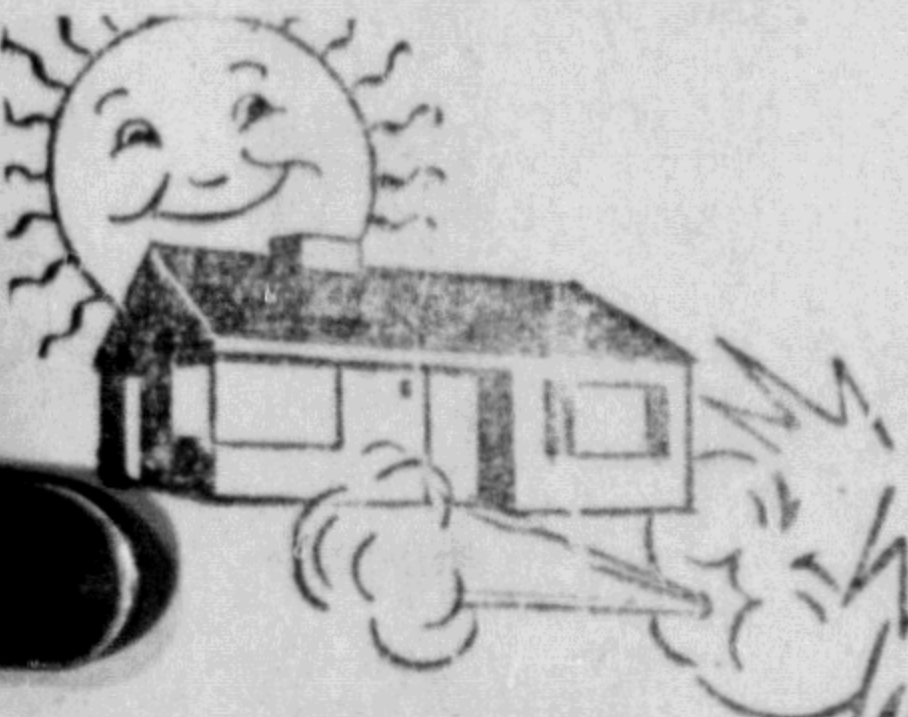

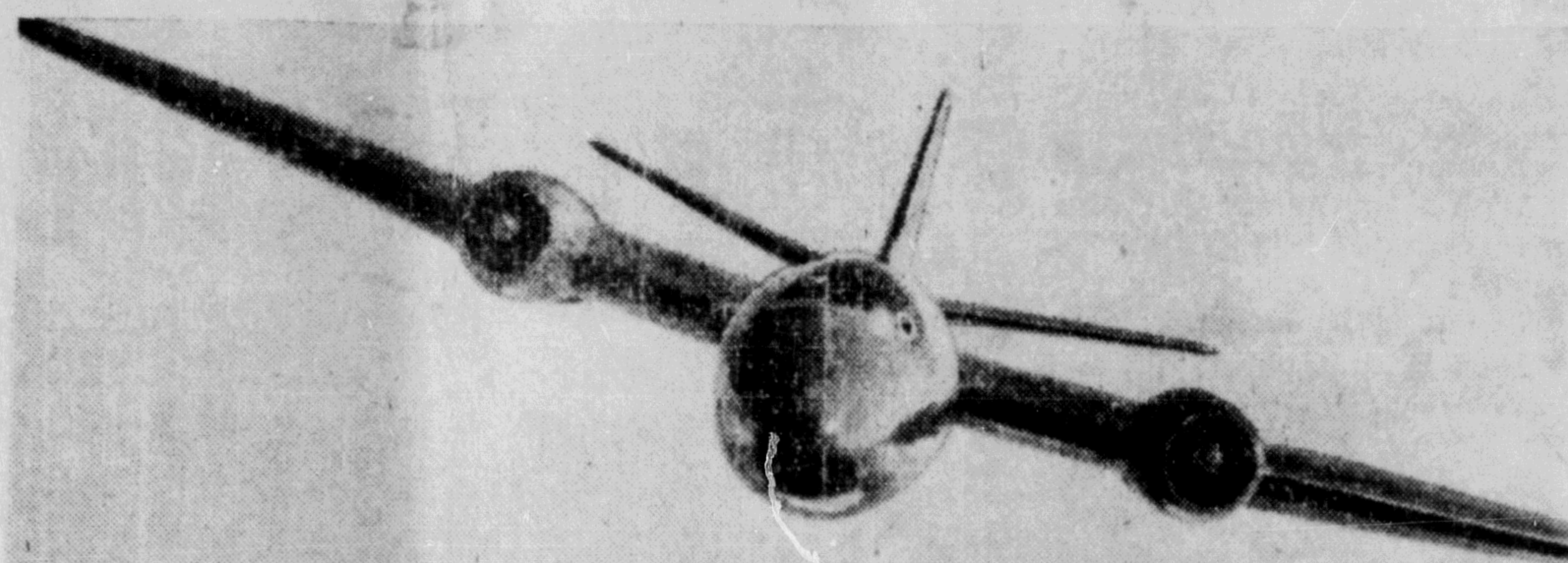

New Halibut Regulations For 1950 Pro- posed—Alaska Fish Moving Through Here

If the present International Halibut Treaty be-
tween Canada and the United States is not amended
fishermen along the western coast of both countries
hope the governments can get together and allow the
practice of alternating halibut fishing periods.

This was recommended to the International

Fisheries Commission during a

conference board hearing of the
Commission in Seattle, Janu-
ary 19. Delegates from points
along the west coast including
G. Andersen, secretary of the

Prince Rupert Deep Seas Fish-
ermen's Union, recommended
that this year's season open
May 1 and that next year's op-
ening date barring treaty am-

endments would be June 1
and 1952 would commence Ap-
ril 1. This would enable fish-
ermen to get different stocks
of fish.

About 13 other recommenda-
tions were presented including
an increase in quota. The 15
delegates met January 18 and
drew up the recommendations

presenting them to the Com-
mission the following day.

The present Halibut Treaty
stipulates the season open May
1. For some time now, fisher-
men here and along the west
coast have been running up
against a brick wall in attempt-
ing to amend the treaty so
split season be allowed. But the
two governments have given op-
posing interpretations which
are holding back any change.

After laying off for a week

Channel.

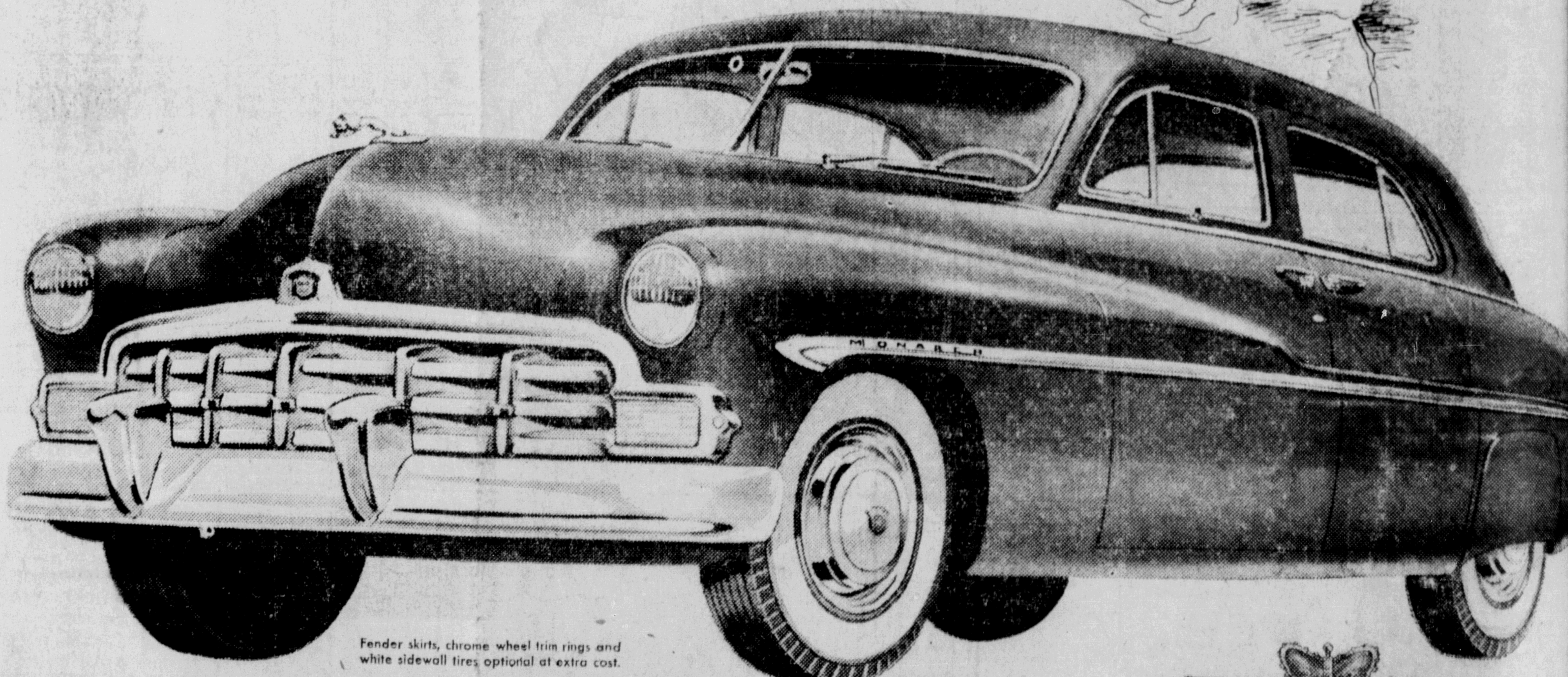
