PRINCE RUPERT YEARS AGO

June 23, 1923

Because of a shortage of refrigerator cars, sale of 180,000 pounds of halibut on the fish exchange was postponed. Four cars were expected to arrive during the night but this was only half the required capacity. Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. bought the only cargo—65,000 pounds at 12 1/2 and 9 cents.

Following the sinking of the Belmont-Surf Inlet Mining Co.'s launch Belmont in Grenville Channel, it was announced that the tug McCullough would make efforts to salvage her. In the meantime, the company's spare yacht, Full Moon, went into service between Prince Rupert and Surf Inlet.

The Merchant Marine Freighter Canadian Transporter was due to arrive in port to load lumber for the Orient. There was 450,000 board feet waiting at the dock. The lumber came from the Little, Royal and Lakelse mills in the Skeena Valley.

June 22, 1913

ENTRANCED WITH DRIVE

Alaska Sportsman Tells of Motor Trip from Toledo to Prince Rupert

The Alaska Sportsman for July prints the second and final instalment of a descriptive story by W. R. Billingsley of his drive from Toledo, Ohio, to Ketchikan by way of Prince Rupert.

There are some impressions of Prince Rupert. The first gives details of the long ride from the old home city in Ohio to Smithers. Mr. Billingsley had his wife and family with him and they evidently were an alert and vastly interested party.

Leaving Smithers, the writer makes brief references to Hazelton, as follows:

"We had heard that it was beautifully situated. The beauty of its site is beyond description."

The ride along the Skeena River is well pictured and, approaching Rupert, there is this: "In due time we reached the top of the mountain, rounded a curve and found ourselves in brilliant sunshine. Far below we could see stretches of the road winding down the mountain through dense green forests lying close along an arm of the sea. A magnificent sight."

"Now we ran into traffic. We must have met a car every five minutes. Surely we were approaching Prince Rupert. We saw a sign which told us we were crossing the city limits of Prince Rupert. But where was the town? We were still driving in forest. But another mile and the town was before us. We were now on paved streets and drove down to the dock. We located the customs office and learned what papers would be required for our car. We were hungry, and in a snug little restaurant advertising sea food 'Ma' found her choice—a delicious salmon steak."
