

He pictured to the children, a land of "little people," tiny folk who were discovered by children and who, because of their size, were treated in the manner of dolls by the young-

He carried the picture further into real life by comparing this to the days of colonization, when native inhabitants, often aboriginal, were treated in somewhat similar manner by the stronger races.

This idea, he said, was outmoded and now all people regardless of their strength, should have the right to enjoy their lives under the principles of democracy.

The program concluded with the singing of the anthem "Land of Our Birth" and "Land of Hope and Glory" by children from all the schools under direction of Principal J. S. Wilson of Borden Street: a medley of Empire songs by the King Ed-
