SHORT SPORT

The oldest annual turf classic in North America, the King's Plate, will be run Monday next at Toronto when a field of top Canadian three-year-olds meet in the 80th running of the historic event with its purse of 50 guineas and \$10,000 added. A throng of 40,000 is expected to crowd old Woodbine Park to watch the dozen or so thoroughbred match speed and stamina over the gruelling mile-and-one-eighth gallop in Canada's top racing fixture. Eastern stock has held the coveted trophy since its presentation in 1860 in honor of Queen Victoria. But since nominations were extended in 1944 from Ontario to railbirds see a strong western threat from the topsy-turvy field of campaigners.

Lord Fairmond, western hope from Whittier Park Stables of Winnipeg, entered the charmed circle of favorites when he turned in a dawn work-out mile in 1:41 3/5 recently. The brown colt by Fairmond out of Sweepden, will be piloted by Albert-born Johnny Longden, the bronzed veteran who recently made American turf history when he booted home his 3,000th winner. Graduating from the Alberta wheat fields, the 38-year-old veteran was signed three weeks ago by Lord Fairmond's owner R. J. Speers. Pre-race forkouts have failed to establish a heavy favorite but horsemen think Sweepden, carrying the rouble-blue silks of Toronto's Hatch Stables, may repeat the winning performance of Hatch's entries in 1941, 1944, and 1945.

Established in 1860 as the Queen's Plate, this foremost of Canadian races was run as such until 1902 when it was changed to its present name. The King's purse has been presented every year though the rules for the classic changed through the

years. Originally the race rotated among various Ontario centres but in 1883 it was established permanently at Toronto's Woodbine Park. In 1944 two other changes were made; the \$8,000-added money was increased to \$10,000 and owners were allowed to take their plate-race horses south of the border for winter training. But if they race across the border they are disqualified.

With 20 King's Plate victories—eight won consecutively from 1891 to 1898—the famous

Seagram Stable is well out in front since Don Juan won the inaugural running of Canada's richest horse race at Carleton Place, Ont. The Hatch and Giddings Stables follow the yellow and black silks with five each in its unbroken 89-year old history. The race has been staged at Carleton, Guelph, Hamilton, St. Catharines, Whitby, Kingston, Ottawa, Barrie, Woodstock,

Prescott and Picton. Although bettors will remember last year's Plate upset when a rank outsider, Moldy, thundered into the stretch, turning back a half-dozen favorites, to reach the wire and just fall short of Utmost's track favorite of 1:33 4/5 set in 1945. Advertise in the Daily News!

HOW CAN I ???

Q. How can I clean walls thoroughly?

A. A good solution for cleaning painted walls is 1 cup of kerosine, 1 cup of vinegar, 1 cup hot water. Apply with a cloth, then wipe thoroughly with another soft cloth.

Q. How can I remove onion odor from the fingers after peeling onions?

A. Wash them in a solution of baking soda and water, using a small vessel.
