Let Us Remember

TOMORROW, as we pay homage to those who laid down their lives in two world wars in the hope that those who survived might live in a peaceful world free from tyranny and oppression, we can not but view with uncertainty and concern what lies ahead. But in choosing our course of action, the sacrifice of those we honor on Remembrance Day must be considered and the goal they had before them must be our goal.

Today Canadian seamen and airmen are engaged in a struggle to keep alive our ideals of opportunity for all and least possible restraint on the freedom of the individual. A ground force has completed its training, and the advance party has entered the Korean theatre of war to prepare for active participation. Once more loved ones at home are suffering the uneasiness and anxiety they feel for those who are exposed to danger. For the third time in the memory of many the citadel of our free way of life is being assailed by armed forces of aggression.

But tomorrow we take time out from our worries of today to glance back with pride and sadness on the accomplishments of fellow Canadians on the field of honor, to pay tribute to those who ended their lives there and to consider those who, although not killed, have had their lives and bodies broken by the evil forces of war.

It is not enough to bow our heads in prayer for them for a few moments. We must pray for the strength and guidance that will be required to bring the world through this dangerous period. We must back up our prayers with effort. We must cut out petty differences with neighbors as the first step in cutting out international differences. We must try to understand the other fellow's problems that we may know better what steps to take to settle disputes with the least chance of open conflict. This we owe to those we honor tomorrow.

In the words of John McCrea's famous poem:

"If ye break faith with us who die,
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders' fields."

Rate of Pay For Mounties

OTTAWA—Recruits entering the service of the RCMP draw \$3.75 a day and board and lodgings for the first year. The pay scale thereafter is \$4 per day the second year, and after that a basic rate of \$4.50 a day. Higher ranks bring more money.

In 1948 vessels engaged in sea-going and inland international service entered Canadian ports at the rate of 600 per week.

WEEK-END SERMON

THE REAL NEED

(By CAPTAIN W. C. POULTON, Salvation Army)
TEXT: "I will work a work in your days, which ye will not believe, though it be told you."—Habakkuk 1:5.

So many weird and unforeseen things happen these days that we have become blasé and hardened to shock and surprise. The strides made by science are such that we just accept as fact the next steps they plan to take. Our grandfathers had lived through a period that was largely static. Our fathers

saw the beginning of the great inventive age. We have become so used to it that we demand more, and yet still more, of what we choose to call "progress."

I am often reminded of a very old but very true saying which runs thus: "Because it is old it is not necessarily good and because it is new it is not necessarily better for there is good in the old and bad in the new just as there is vice-versa."

The greatest need of man today is still beyond the miracle men of science to provide. All the skills of the technocrat, the mechanic, the man of state-craft, the laboratory technician, the physicist and others fall in the great particular of which I speak. The solution of this need would make it possible for all men, the wide world over, to enjoy the things that we accept as normal in the Western world. The settlement of this requirement of man would release millions of man-hours for further research and invention. This need is the paramount thing occupying God's time on our behalf.

It is the need for man to be able to live as God intended he should live. There will be those who will say there is no settled plan of such living. They are wrong. God gave us a definite plan . . . To glorify God, subdue the Earth, Be Our Brother's Keeper.

Man's failure caused God great suffering and pain. This pain is best seen in the suffering of His Son Jesus Christ on Cal-

vary. In that very suffering and atonement, God showed us a work which far too many will not believe.

The mind that will readily accept Mr. Einstein's theory of relativity, or the feasibility of rocket trips to the Moon and Mars, finds it impossible to believe that the death of Jesus Christ atones for their sin and rids them of the guilt of their sins.

"Having eyes they see not, having ears they hear not." Remember it was Jesus who said that. He also said to a very intelligent man of his day . . . "Marvel not that I say unto you, ye must be born again." "Behold I will work a work in your days, which ye will not believe, though it be told you."

It is still the outstanding marvel of our day. What is? This great plan of Salvation for man's soul.
