UNITED CHURCH THANKSGIVING

There were large attendances both morning and evening at the First United Church on Sunday when the annual Thanksgiving services were held. At the close of the morning service the quarterly Communion Service was observed.
Speaking from the words, "He took Bread," Rev. L. G. Sieber reminded his congregation of the interest Jesus always showed in everyday affairs. To Him all ordinary matters had a significance of which He was always keenly aware. Today people had a tendency to take things for granted and often it was only when God's bounty seemed to fail that they call upon Him. God's promises never failed. The miracle of the loaves and fishes was repeated annually but was not recognized. Bread was the symbol of the answer to human need and Christ used it as the symbol of God's answer to man's spiritual need. Assumption that one earned food failed to recognize that, for all material needs, there was dependence upon God. It was well that at Thanksgiving time at least, expression was given to recognition of God's unflinching goodness.

At the evening service Mr. Sieber challenged his listeners with the questions of what they expected from life, how much was enough and what would they do if they had enough. The psalmist asked that he be free from vanity and the too possession of material things should not prevent him from appraising properly the greater value of spiritual possessions. And in the world today it is not a shortage of material things that caused suffering among people, but a lack of brotherliness in sharing possessions. More than all there was a need for the harvest of the spirit. It was still very true that "Your heavenly Father knows of your needs." He supplied them. Men must learn to use them aright.
The Junior Choir sang effectively W. H. Jule's setting of "Thou Didst Leave Thy Throne" during the morning service, and in the evening service the Senman, J. H. Thompson, Edna Harding and Wm. Dams.
