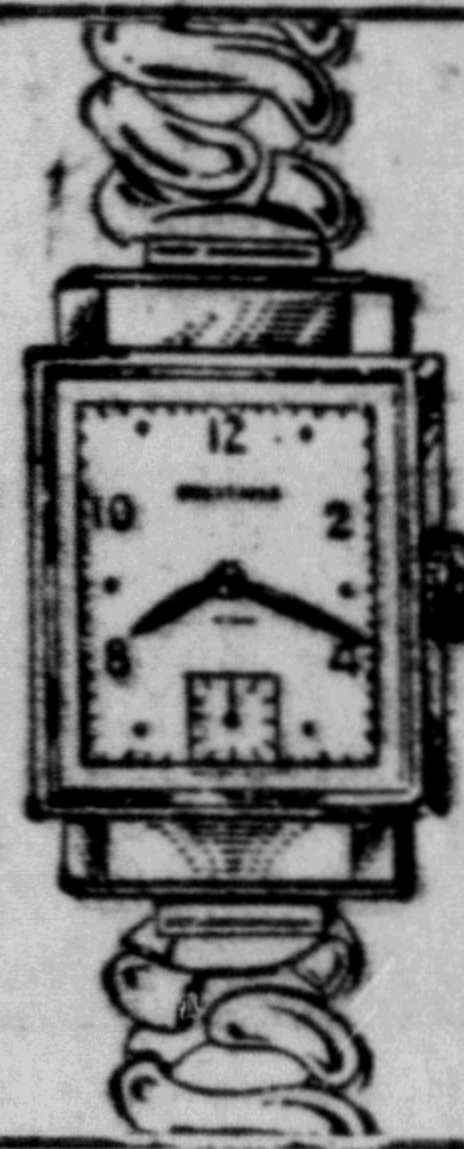

**July Month
Was Dreary**

Precipitation Unusually Heavy While Sunshine Was Scarce

The dull, rainy July in Prince Rupert this year is reflected in official figures summarizing the weather for that month here. Precipitation amounted to 6.48 inches on twenty-five days while sunshine aggregated a mere 82.3 hours on fifteen days. So far this year precipitation in the city has amounted to 45.06 inches compared with 48.15 inches in the first seven months of 1949 while sunshine has totalled 630.9 hours as against 538.3 hours in the corresponding period in 1949. So, while July was not a very favorable month from the weather standpoint, the year to date, owing to the fine months of May and June, is showing a sustained improvement over 1949.

Here are the official weather figures for July as announced by the Dominion meteorologist at Digby Island: Maximum temperature, 73.5 on July 21. Minimum temperature, 41.5 or July 1. Total precipitation, 6.48 inches. Total sunshine, 82.3 hours. Maximum wind velocity, south, 20 miles per hour, July 17. Maximum barometer reading, at sea level, 30.40 on July 20. Minimum barometer reading, 29.81 on July 9.

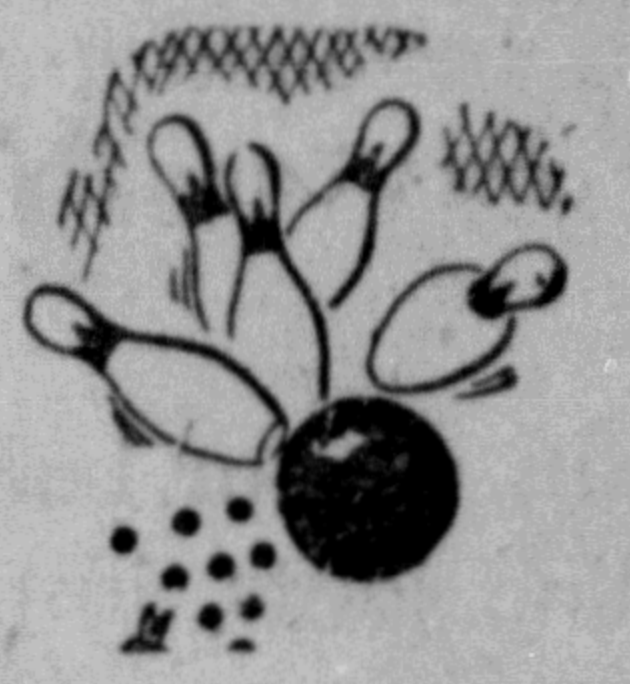
