Prospector Of Stewart Dies

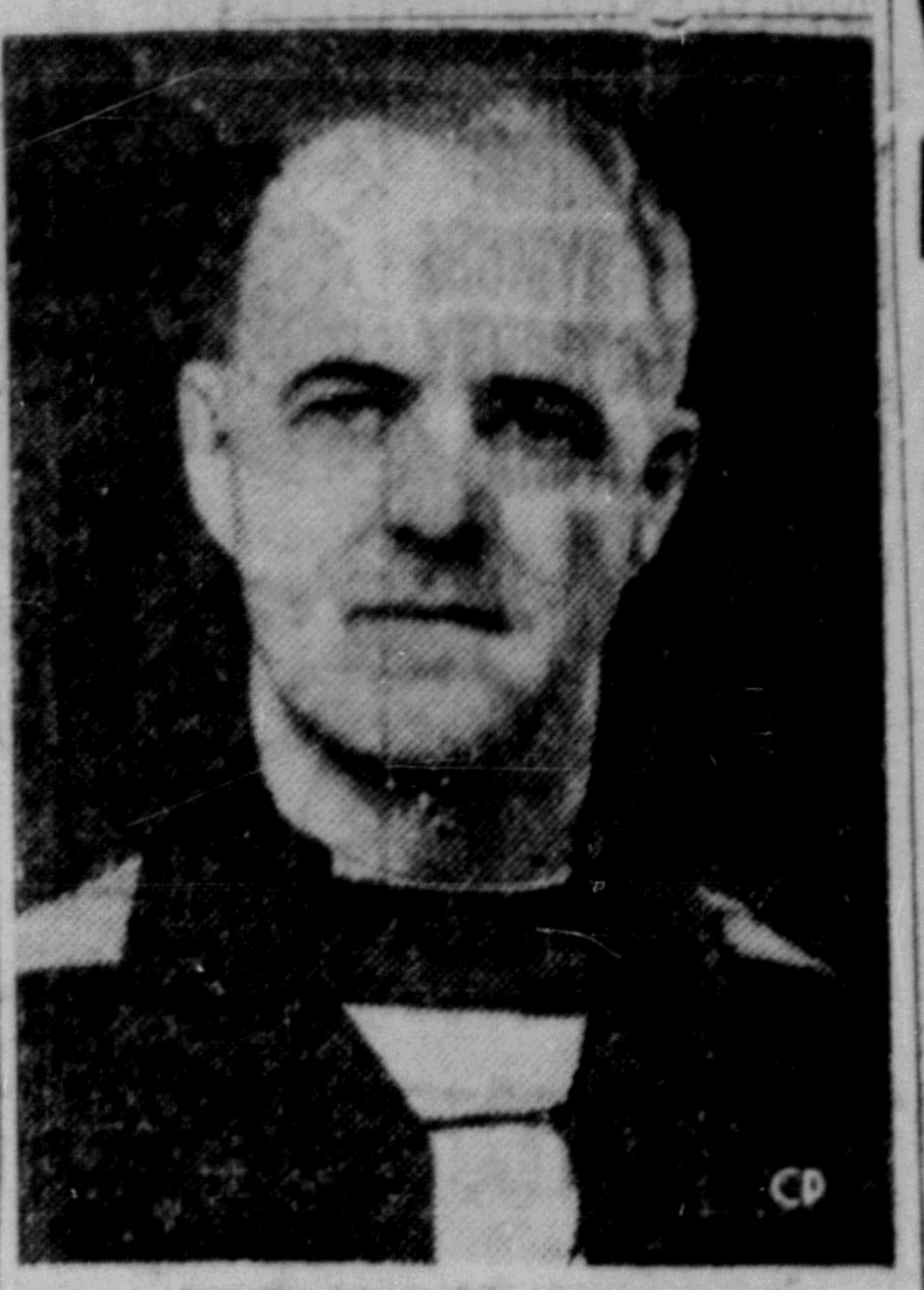
