

In thinking mainly of ourselves, we have not benefited ourselves. We might have welcomed people bringing to us "their capital, their skills, their industries, their artisanship, their artistic qualifications and sometimes even ther export trade." We argued that we lacked the power to absorb these people. In our hindsight we know that we could have used every one of the tens of thousands that might have come to us to our own vast advantage. But, even when we liberalized our policy, we continued to argue the matter on a basis of political, sectional and religious expediency. So the opportunities slipped by. 'Now, theoretically, we favor immigration, but -we still boggee over the fallacious argument that more people from abroad means "less to go round among the native born." That was not true of the United States. It is not true of Canada with its opening frontiers. There is opportunity for growth. There is benefit, the benefit of sharing with more people the overhead burden of canals and roads and railroads and war debts; more people to employ the productive capital that provides not only a generous living for us all but demands also new hands to make it further productive. All history tells us that no nation ever retained the lands and opportunities it did not occupy and employ. No nation can serve a world and selfishly retain all its own advantages. What we need is an active, dynamic policy of selecting, securing and
