WASHINGTON, D.C. (P)-President Truman and Prime Minister Attlee today anounced a ten-point program for the defence of the free world

The communique was issued after days of crucial conferences between the two leaders required by the world crisis created by intervention of Communist China in the Korean war.

The ten-point program was produced after a review of what the communique describes as "changed aspect of world affairs arising from massive intervention of Chinese Communists in Korea."

The communique announced complete agreement on the need for immediate action for building up of North Atlantic defences in Europe.


Truman and Attlee announced agreement on increasing military capabilities of their two countries "as rapidly as possible" and expansion of arms production.

Ottawa and Provinces Would

Improve Old Age Pensions

OTTAWA - With agreement between Canada's eleven governments that two important constitutional amendments should be considered dealing with old age pensions and proposed provincial retail sales the federal-provincial conference on fiscal and social security problems concluded yesterday.

They agreed to give "early consideration" to constitutional steps to launch an old age pension plan for pensions with means test for persons between 65 and 69, the two governments going fifty-fifty, while the persion after 70 would be without a means test.

The second constitutional amendment would allow the provincial governments to impose sales tax on retail purchases Announcement of the agreement was made by Prime Minister L. S. St. Laurent as the federal and provincial representatives ended four days' study of the tough economic problems facing the country.

The Department of Justice will draw up the amendments
