LOW HEMLINE ON PARACHUTES

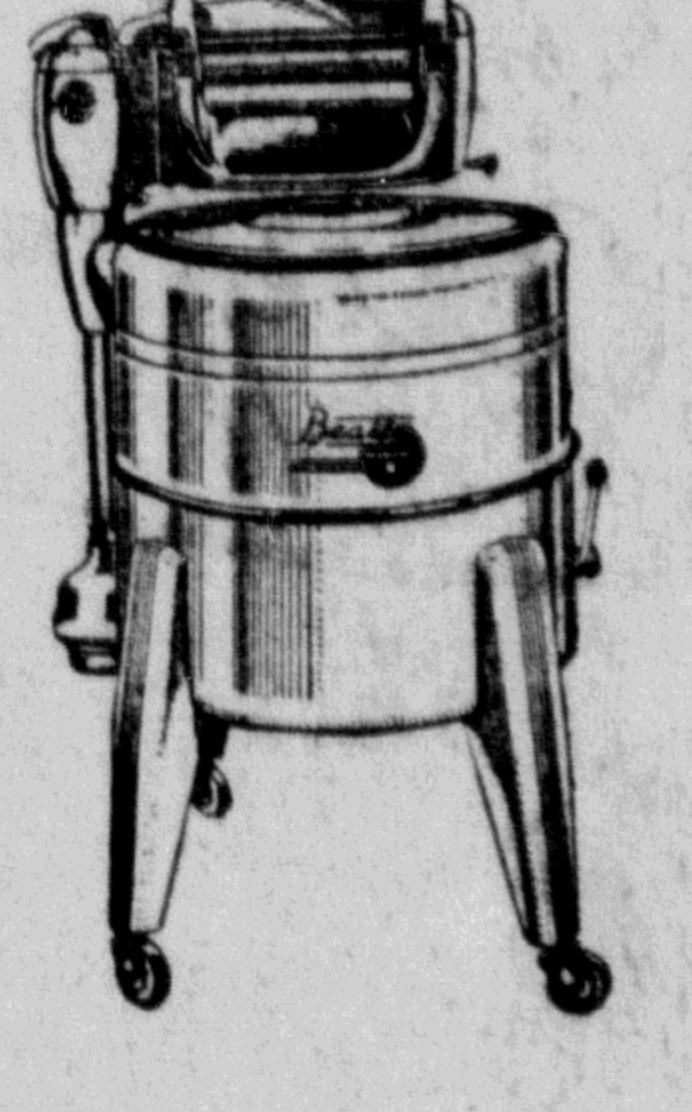
