Waterfront Whiffs

First known casualty in the halibut fleet in Area
No. 2 was the Invercan III, Capt. Bert Hanson of
Vancouver. Capt. Hanson, a former old time resident
of Prince Rupert, brought his vessel into harbor here
Thursday afternoon with fuel line trouble, a broken
anchor winch, a dead generator and other minor
headaches.

Leaving the city Tuesday
night, the skipper related, the
generator began growing weak
and finally conked out. The
crew fished in the dark for a
while but finally gave up and
the Captain nosed his vessel for

port. Telephone calls to Van-
couver the afternoon of arrival
here resulted in the sale of his
catch—3,000 pounds—to Bacon
Fisheries.

Wednesday night, the Cap-
tain said sadly, a 40 to 50 mile
per hour wind created a miser-
able fishing atmosphere in Hec-
cete Straits. On Friday, high
wind velocity continued to pre-
vail. After sale of their catch at
Bacon Fisheries, the crew put
the vessel into dry dock for
repairs.

Buys First Again

Bill Bacon was smiling more
broadly than ever Thursday.
But a smile is always prevalent
with Bill, so the reporter asked
the reason for the glow.

"I bought the first catch of
halibut again this year," ex-
claimed the packing man. Bill
explained that last year he also
purchased the first load for sale
on the open market. The pack-
ing on the waterfront was busy
Thursday afternoon as Cap-

Bert Hanson unloaded his In-
vercan III and Bill was busy as
ever grading the sleek delicious
fish; all 3,000 pounds.

The first vessel to sell to
Bacon Fisheries was the Joan F.
Capt. J. Cooks of Vancouver.
His catch was 8,000 pounds and
he sold for 19.5 cents, or speak-
ing in good Canadian folding
money—\$1,560.

An unscheduled visitor in
Prince Rupert yesterday was the
American trawler Plover. Captain
Tony Zuanich, out of Bellingham.
Trouble in the return pipes from
the salt water pump to the sea
cock forced them into port
Thursday afternoon about 2 p. m.
They were able to find suitable
pipe here and made their own
repairs. The Plover sailed Friday
morning at sun up.

The boat sailed last Saturday
from Bellingham and had aboard
6,000 pounds of bottom fish when
she docked. When she left here
she sailed again for Hecate Stra-
to complete her load of about
60,000 pounds before returning
to her home port about a week
hence. Crew members are Al
Bauter, Al Binchus and Earl Peel.
Asked what they did if they pulled
up halibut in the trawl, Cap-
tain Zuanich said the first thing
they did was to throw them back
into the sea so that as many as
possible would live. However, he
said, no matter how quickly they
acted, it was inevitable that some
of the fish would die. For that
reason, he thought it was un-
fortunate that a percentage of
the catch was not allowed to be
halibut. He realized, he said, that
there had to be some control to
protect halibut fishermen but he
felt it was a waste of resources
