YOUNG WOMAN'S CASE ADJOURNED

Magistrate W. D. Vance took
a sympathetic view Friday af-
ternoon of an appeal for sus-
pended sentence in behalf of
Mrs. Arthur Cornish, who plead-
ed guilty on Monday to a charge
of break and entry and of re-
taining stolen property.

Mrs. Cornish had admitted
involvement in unlawful entry
into a city home two weeks ago
and theft from another resi-
dence a week ago which re-
sulted in her husband being
sentenced to two years in the
penitentiary.

J. T. Harvey, Mrs. Cornish's
counsel, told the court that she
had come from a good home
and had never become involved
in unlawful activities until af-
ter her marriage. The teen-aged
girl, he said, had resisted per-
suasion to take part in the
house-breakings but had finally
yielded to the influence of
her husband.

Mr. Harvey urged that she be
given suspended sentence and
placed in the care of her moth-
er rather than be sent to jail.

Magistrate Vance agreed that
such a course would probably
be best but adjourned final sen-
tencing until approval of the
Attorney General is forthcoming
for suspended sentence. Sgt.
L. A. N. Potterton, who prose-
cuted, said that he had no ob-
jection to a suspended sen-
tence.

The case was adjourned for
eight days or earlier pending
word from the Attorney Gen-
eral's department.

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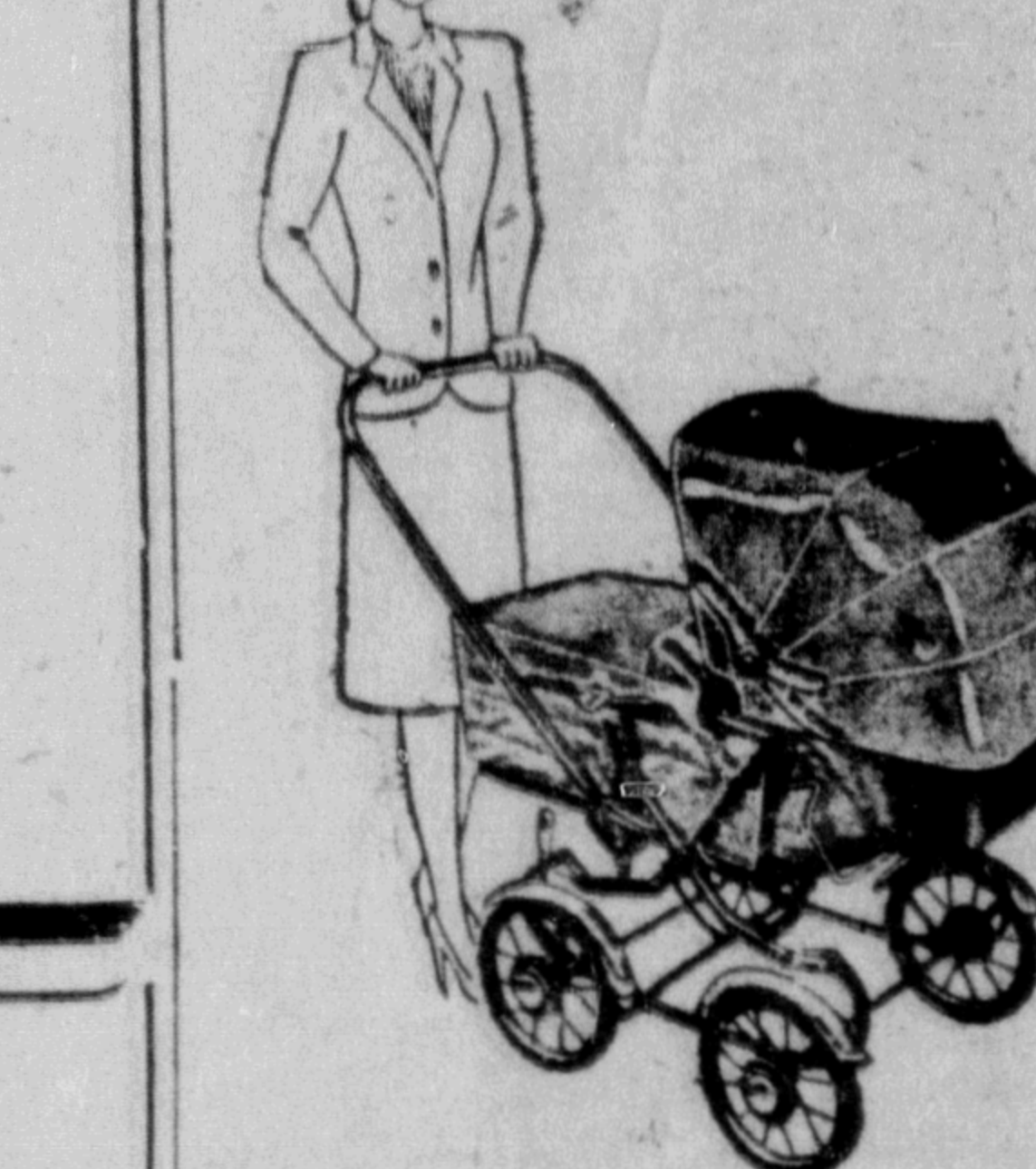
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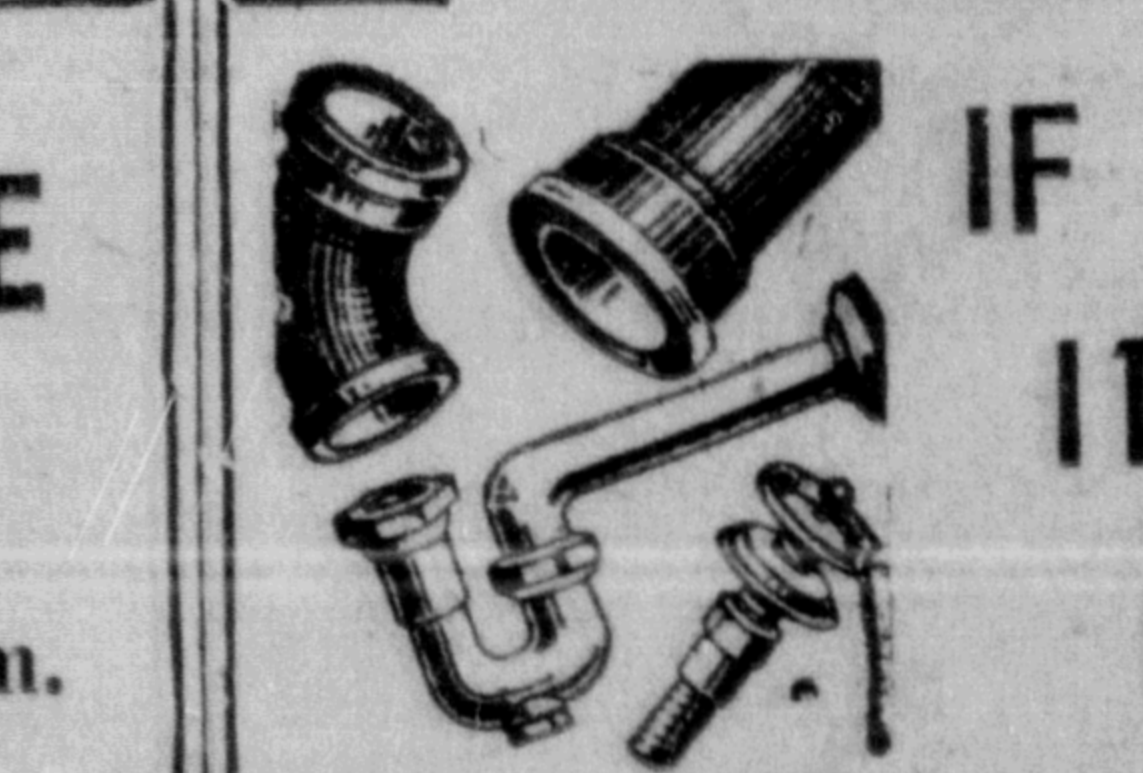


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
