Oslo Chosen For Olympics

Bislet Stadium in Heart of Norwegian Capital to be Main Arena for 1952 Games

OSLO (Reuters)—Bislet Stadium, site of many international sport events and situated in the heart of Oslo, has been chosen as the main arena for the 1952 winter Olympics. Work soon will start to increase its seating capacity from 28,000 to 40,000.

Construction is expected to start shortly on new hotels to accommodate the anticipated influx of visitors. One of these hotels, to be named the Viking, will be reserved for the foreign press. The Viking will be built in the city near the east station.

Other planned construction includes erection of Norway's first bob-run, building of an artificial ice-rink in the Jordal Stadium in Oslo, and improvements on the world-famous ski-jumping hill at Holmenkollen.

All the events, except the downhill ski race, will be within easy reach of the city's centre.

The Olympic slalom hill course, also situated in the city, has a length of 422.5 metres with a drop of 169 metres. It has been used for a number of international slalom contests and is considered very difficult.

The start is 479 metres above sea level and the finish about 310 metres. There is ample room for spectators. Plans allow for up to 20,000 and a ski-lift has been ordered which should be completed by fall of this year.

One of the most difficult tasks facing the Norwegian Olympic committee was the construction of the bob-run. Bobsledding is quite a new sport to Norwegians, and experts from Switzerland

SWISS BUILDS TRACK

Work is now in full swing on the run at Frognersteter Hill. A Swiss expert is superintending the building up of the track which will be ready for trials next winter. The track will have a total length of 1,550 metres with a drop of 114 metres, starting at 429 metres above sea level.

The new artificial ice rink, where the hockey events will be held, is to be built on the site of the existing Jordal Stadium, in the east end of Oslo. It will hold about 10,000 spectators. Work will start some time this month.

Plans for the new stadium include the erection of a stage on top of the refrigeration building, making it possible to use the site in the summer for theatrical performances and concerts.

The downhill ski race is the only event which will take place outside the city boundaries. The course chosen lies in the Kroensherad district, about 60 miles northwest of Oslo. This is a difficult and well-known course used every year during the Holmenkollen ski races.

With the start 900 metres above sea level and the finish at 190 metres, the course has a drop of 710 metres and a total length of 2,435 metres. The start lies well above the tree-line, but about four-fifths of the course lies through forest.

For the games, the course is to be widened and a new women's downhill course constructed. A new bridge will be built across the narrow Lake Kroderen. Fjeldhvil hotel, situated close to the course just at the tree-line, is to be enlarged and a new approach road built. There is also to be a new tourist lodge with 100 beds, and a new first-class hotel to accommodate 150 guests.

A special telecommunication building is to be put up near the finishing line to house 12 broadcasting transmitters, switchboards for telephone and telegraph, and offices for officials.
